
St. Paul the Apostle and Immaculate Conception Churches

FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Christ, the power of God and the wisdom of God.

Last summer I decided to get reacquainted with the major world religions. I took down from my bookshelf a couple of my favorite books on Zen Buddhism. I doggedly plodded my way again through the Koran. And, knowing very little about Hinduism, I read for the first time a selection of the Upanishads — a collection of various teachings dating from about 800 B.C. to 1400 A.D.

In this ancient wisdom of India we recognize some familiar spiritual principles: "Beholding the world of action, let the lover of God attain renunciation: what is above creation cannot be attained by action." These words could be those of St. John of the Cross.

The Second Vatican Council declared: "The Catholic Church rejects nothing which is true and holy in other religions. She looks with sincere respect upon those ways of conduct and of life which often reflect a ray of the Truth which enlightens all men."

This does not mean that all religions are equal, or that all religions lead to God. The ancient Norse religion with its worship of Thor and Odin provides some interesting mythology, but it leads nowhere.

When St. Paul was spreading the Gospel, he was contending against belief in the many gods and goddesses of the Greek pantheon. There was a riot in Ephesus because the people felt that their goddess Artemis was being slighted. Where are the worshipers of Artemis now?

Some religions condone evil. The Canaanites sacrificed their children to the god Moloch. Human sacrifice was part of the Aztec culture. The atrocities committed in our own day by ISIS and Boko Haram are claimed to have a religious basis in radical Islam. These religious beliefs have nothing in common with the fundamentals of Christianity.

Still, even in the worse religions, we see that there are good people. I am sure that among the Aztecs there were many who were horrified at the thought of human sacrifice. There are many Muslims who reject Jihad and the strict interpretation of Sharia law.

I admire the human and spiritual wisdom in Buddhism and Hinduism and Greek philosophy. Within these traditions there is a sincere search for wisdom and ultimate truth; a striving for the good, the true and the beautiful; a striving for God.

The world has many religions and wisdom traditions. Many reflect a "ray of truth," some more than others. The wisdom and true humanity of these religions deserves our utmost respect, and there is in fact much that we can learn from them. At the same time, we know that the striving for spiritual wisdom that is so evident in many religions has its complete fulfillment in Christ. As St. Paul said: "We preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to the Jews and folly to the gentiles, but to those who are called, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God."

We have always tried to expose our deaf children to both communities. As their parents, we have talked to them and tried to answer their questions when they saw someone using sign language and they had basic sign language books. Then one day our oldest son, Ethan, said he would like to learn sign language. We discovered Silent Voice's Sign Language Summer camp and enrolled him in the program. The following year Gavin joined his older brother and they both want to go again. We also put our name in for the Family Communication program because we wanted to support our children. These opportunities increased the boys' awareness of the deaf community and also helped them gain respect for different ways of communication. They enjoyed both experiences as did we. We all hope to take part in the Family program again. Last year more than 600 deaf children received support through Silent Voice's Sign Language Summer Camps.
