FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Knowing right from wrong

The late resolution of the Quakers in Philadelphia to set at liberty all their negro slaves, may satisfy us that their number cannot be very great. Had they made any considerable part of their property, such a resolution could never have been agreed to.

- Adam Smith, The Wealth of Nations, 1776.

It may seem that Adam Smith is being cynical, but that is not at all the case; he is merely being analytical and practical. He notes that slave labor is actually more expensive than the labor of free men. Being a perceptive observer of human nature, Smith adds:

The pride of man makes him love to domineer, and nothing mortifies him so much as to be obliged to condescend to persuade his inferiors. Wherever the law allows it, therefore, he will generally prefer the service of slaves to that of free men. The planting of sugar and tobacco [in the South] can afford the expense of slave cultivation. The raising of corn [in the North], it seems, in the present time, cannot.

It has been said that morality represents the way that people would like the world to work; economics represents how it actually does work. It was easy in the Northern states to see slavery as a human injustice because there was little economic interest in owning slaves. In the South, however, the use of slaves was so deeply rooted in the economy and in the culture that it seemed the "natural" state of things, and it was almost impossible to see slavery as an evil.

The lesson for us is that the true knowledge of good and evil is often obscured by our economics and by our culture. This is what Hannah Arendt referred to as the "banality of evil." Arendt describes the situation where evil is done "under circumstances that make it well-nigh impossible for one to know or to feel that he is doing wrong."

It is easy to see an evil that you are not involved in. During the Second World War, Roosevelt took Churchill to task for Britain's continued colonial rule of India. Churchill then brought up the question of civil rights for blacks in the United States. Roosevelt then changed the subject.

The evil of the abuse of children in residential schools is now glaringly obvious. But most of our neighbors do not see the evil of the abuse of children by the Wynne government's sex-education curriculum, or by the imposition of Gay-Straight Alliance groups in our High Schools. We do not see the immensely greater evil of abortion and euthanasia. Abortion-provider Planned Parenthood selling baby parts is abhorrently evil, but it is the whistle-blower who faces criminal charges. The evil is too close for many to see it for what it is.

So how then can we truly tell the difference between good and evil? I once was lost, but now am found; was blind, but now I see. Christ is the true measure of all things.


