

I visited mom on the anniversary of dad's death, the real date, not mom's date. I opted not to visit her on Family Day as I think one of my brothers was taking the opportunity. So Family Day became a catch up clean-up day. I had two somewhat larger tasks that have been hanging over me. One of my favorite comic strips, besides Peanuts, was the Family Circus, especially the ones where one of the children was sent off on a simple errand and the tracking of footprints indicates that the child is taking the long way around with many distractions and extra tasks. That is how my One of the tasks was to clear the rectory fover of the dav went. accumulation of paint cans from last summer's painting of my sitting room, the piled decorations from Christmas including some of the nativity items, and finally, to find a place to store the numerous plant pots that have amassed that had found a temporary holding place under the table there. So I started by finding a trolley that would make life easier. The trolley had some offertory envelopes in the room where all the uncollected boxes remain. So for the next hour I sorted the boxes, but to do that, I had to transport one of the nativity scene shelves which would work perfectly be a good storage. Ontario Government Easing Restrictions & what it means for us

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is quickly approaching; March 2. It remains a universal day of Fasting & Abstinence. We have received

directives from the Archdiocese. This year we are permitted to distribute Ashes at a live celebration. The procession is the same as for communion - single file down the centre aisle maintaining 6 foot distancing.

Ashes will be distributed at the 10:00 am Mass and we will have a 7:00 pm evening Mass with distribution. It is a first come first serve basis for seating and the doors will be closed 5 minutes before the celebration begins or when capacity is reached, whichever comes first.



Inspired by the Holy Spirit

Pope Francis has invited the People of God to join in a "synodal process" of discerning, listening and speaking. He has asked us to reflect on where we believe the Holy Spirit is leading the Church in our day. He has extended a

special invitation to those who feel marginalized, disinterested or even separated from the Church. Each diocese has designed their own process for gathering the inspired thoughts of people. However, some people may wish for more engagement and others may not feel comfortable sharing their thoughts through the regular channels. To this end Concerned Lay Catholic - is offering listening sessions for older Catholics, LGBTQ+ folks & their families and friends, victims/survivors of clerical sexual abuse, lay ecclesial ministers and others employed by the Church, people of other faith communities and people who are unable to participate in the regular diocesan or parish listening sessions. Fasting & Abstinence Ash Wednesday & Good Friday are universal days of Fasting & Abstinence. These are two ancient Lenten practices. In Canada, Fasting refers to one regular meal and two lesser meals (no snacks!) for those between the ages of 18 and 59, and those medically able to do so. Abstinence means no meat, thus the development of eating fish on Fridays.

First Communion Candidates



Report on the work of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, Newmarket, for the Year 2021. 20 Feb 2022

Dear Fellow Parishioners.

Thank you for your continued financial support. Combined, the people of Newmarket donated \$132,770 toward the work of our SSVP Conference in 2021 – with most of that money coming from the parishioners of the two Newmarket parishes of St John Chrysostom and St Elizabeth Seton. This was an amazingly generous response in the circumstances. So, how did we use the \$130,487 that we spent of your donations?

Our Conference offers four main ways of helping the families and individuals in need who come to us:

1. **Good Food Box**: A monthly package of fresh vegetables and fruit valued at \$15 from the York Region Food Network; some families in need receive this twice per month. In 2021 we sponsored 998 of these Good Food Boxes.

2. **Grocery Food Cards** (Food Basics/Metro): Families and individuals in need also need to buy other groceries not available in the Good Food Box and may request food cards from our Society for this purpose once every 3 months - \$20 per family member plus \$40 for the household. Is this enough? Of course not, but it is all our budget will allow. In 2021 we distributed food cards to a total value of \$49,280 to 463 different families and individuals in need.

3. **Christmas Programs**: This last year, pandemic constraints again forced us to abandon the traditional way of selecting stars from the Giving Tree and bringing gifts. Nevertheless, your financial gifts this past Christmas enabled us to provide Christmas cheer for approx. 283 individuals who are seniors and homebound, and approx. 16 families in shelters. In addition, your contributions to our Christmas Program for families with children enabled 117 of our families in need to buy food for a festive meal and Christmas gifts for 272 children. We reported separately on this already in January. The total value of these two programs was \$54,628.

Special Needs: They say that most families in Canada are just one or two pay cheques away from being homeless. Sometimes a family finds themselves in a crunch and needs a leg up or a helping hand to keep their home (for example) or to have a decent bed for a senior with a health condition. We have a budget of \$500 per month to help one or two such families or individuals at a time.

Last year it is estimated that your Vincentians, all volunteers who see their work as a ministry to the Body of Christ, spent just shy of 2,500 hours ensuring that your donations went to the people who needed assistance, especially food assistance – for the low cost of only 1.93% on administration.

<u>Attention: Confirmation Candidates</u> <u>Letter of Intent</u>

In this topsy-turvy year we have not been able to help you much along your journey towards completing your Initiation. From our end, the most important preparation is self reflection. It is customary for candidates to write to the Bishop submitting a Letter of Intent, indicating why they think that the Bishop should accept them for the sacrament of Confirmation. Address your letter (typed or written) to either the Bishop or Fr. Roy, the Bishop's representative.

Here are some guidelines in our extended version of reflecting on Why you want to have the Church Confirm you in your baptism.

1. What was the most significant thing your parents remember about your baptism? Who was there at the Church for this celebration? Who were your godparents? Why did your parents select your name?

2. From the Church's perspective the most important reason for your baptism was so you can participate in the life of the Church each weekend at Mass and join us at the Table of the Lord. Your confirmation will be a continuation in the life of the Church where the expectation will be for you to attend Mass with us each week. What are your fears and or hopes for living your life as a confirmed Catholic?

3. Confirmation expresses specific gifts related to the Holy Spirit; wisdom, understanding, courage, right judgment, knowledge, reverence, and wonder & awe. The prayer of Confirmation includes these gifts and signals that you should be aware of them in your own life. Give an example of each of them as pertains to your life experience, especially as they relate to God-given gifts that are supposed to make your life more filled with integrity.

- 4. What does the Church have to offer you as a fully initiated member?
- 5. What do you have to offer the Church as a fully initiated member?
- 6. Why should the Bishop accept you as a candidate for Confirmation?

At all the masses on the weekend of March 12 & 13, the Second Sunday in Lent, the candidates will be called forward for a little prayer service at which they will submit their Letters of Intent.
