Ruminations

It's such a mystery how and when that magic on/off switch gets changed ushering in the Fall. It seems like over-night that the days are getting markedly shorter, and cooler, and the sunshine seems more precious and appreciated. The sweaters begin to come out and all but we defiant ones have stowed our shorts until late next Spring. It meant that it was time to head over to my aunts' farm and get some of those Fall tasks done. We would clamber through the re-forestation around the pond cleaning the paths of debris and overgrown branches that may hinder a jaunty walk during the fresh days of winter. If you were lucky you might catch a glimpse of a salamander or a turtle basking in the warmth of the sun. All the refuse was collected and piled in the middle of the harvested wheat field waiting for winter to be burned. It was not a time for raking leaves and with hundreds of trees adorning the property, we were very thankful. No, nature was allowed to take its course, and the leaves were allowed to return to the soil from which they came, adding their nutrients to the success of next year's growth. With the back-breaking jog of cutting and dragging downed trees and branches completed, it was time to head over to the orchard. Looking back on my two aunts (actually grandaunts), I began to see what a pair of odd ducks they were, but as children - who But even back then they had one quirky thing that we knew? recognized even as children. The rule for the orchard was that you couldn't pick fruit off the tree, only the fruit that had fallen on the ground. They had stopped long ago tending to the orchard. The trees were old and beautifully gnarled, great character for some horror stories. So many of the apples would have scabs and holes and worms, especially when they were laving on the ground. With old aunts who were going deaf, it was easy enough to distract them and then shake the tree branch or pluck the low hanging fruit without them noticing. We would pick baskets and baskets of fruit which would mean we would spend a couple of days processing them. We had apple jelly, and apple butter, and apple pies, but my favorite was the apple sauce. We had ample to be used throughout the year. My aunts too would fill their larder with jars of preserved apple products, and the freezer was stacked with freshly made apple pies. As we became aware of their quirky apple picking procedures, it always made us somewhat leery whenever one of those pies made it to the table for dessert. It was always accompanied by a scoop or two of ice cream, always vanilla, and there were always hunks of cheddar cheese in the middle of the table for those who liked such things, like my dad. For him, apple pie without cheddar cheese was an abomination and utter incomplete as a

dessert. I on the other hand was disgusted with the thought of mixing the cheese and pie. In fact, I always had my ice cream on the side, not touching the pie. I was never sure what kind of people these relatives were who would do such a thing. To this day I still open my apple pie and take a long, intensive look, ensuring there are no remnants of things that may have at one time, been crawling through my future dessert. Just in time of thanksgiving. Welcome Autumn.

Seating Restriction

This past weekend, apparently there were some belligerent people assailing the ministers of hospitality because people were being ushered into the Hall and a peek into the church looks like there is still lots of room. They seem not to understand the restrictions imposed by the social distancing rules. We are permitted seating only in every third pew. And in those pews, the capacity is determined by the number of people who arrive on the first come- first serve rule. A pew may have the potential for a family or nine to sit together, but is reduced to a capacity of three if people are here solo. The six foot rule means that if someone is not part of your bubble, they need to be six feet away.

The same restrictions exist in the Hall. There must be six foot distancing between groups of people. The same holds true for entering and exiting the church, and for the communion line. So if you peek into the Church and think that you are being ushered into the Hall because you are wearing a Habs hat, such is not the case. We have put a lot of time and energy into trying to keep all our parishioners safe

and sound, so please do not badger the ministers of hospitality who are working on your behalf in compliance with the directives from both the Archdiocese and the Government of Ontario.

To begin, a huge thank you for your continued support and generosity, especially during these challenging times. With the Government Wage Subsidy combined with the reduced demand on the Parish facilities and services, we have been able to remain healthy and in a pretty good financial position. Here are some highlights to give some meat to all those numbers.

The Pandemic reality has had an impact on our financial statement. As you notice the offertory is understandably down, but it was healthy enough to keep us stable and mostly worry free. It looks like the sundry receipts for 2020 is up hugely, but that is the result of the Government Wage Subsidy providing \$70,540 thanks to Jagmeet Singh's lobby the Government (even though I didn't vote for either of them.) The structure of the Wage Subsidy is such that it is on a diminishing sliding scale which means the subsidies are declining and will soon be gone.

In general the expenses are down because of the Pandemic. Our part time workers have been laid off since the beginning of the Pandemic. Along with the savings, all the utilities have been declining because of less demand. Included in the utilities is the savings from the installation of the new lights throughout the building. The switch to LED's is an investment in the parish. Great idea.

Our portion of the Family of Faith campaign was slated to go against our outstanding loan. We might notice that our Diocesan Assessments have come way down, and I am happy to report that we are totally up to date on that item. We are happy, the Archdiocese is happy—everybody is happy.

All in all it is a wonderful position to be in, thanks to your support. When things return to somewhat normal, we will need to make a concerted effort to bring down our Bank loan for the mortgage on the Church and the Chancery loan for the land.
