Ruminations

Sometimes I'm not sure that Mother Nature knows how things are supposed to work here in the Great White North. Sweltering oppressive humid summer days are not meant to go on for weeks at a time. We are not tornado alley, and seasons aren't meant to change with a toss of the switch. Going from summer to autumn overnight isn't just a shock to the rhythm of life, just as we are getting somewhat comfortable with being uncomfortable, but it wreaks havoc with gardening schedules like weeding and watering and fertilizing. Anyway, the long weekend started fresh and cool on Friday morning, cool enough to inspire some overdue tasks that the heat delayed. So early in the morning, while it was still long sleeve shirt weather, I started attacking the parking lot island flower beds. The day lilies were far spent and in desperate need of some pruning and plucking. I never realized just how many day lily plants we have over the six islands – over 125 plants, many needing to be divided. Now for about three weeks in the middle of the summer, these plants that seem to miraculously survive the exorbitant winter salting regimen and still bloom, explode in to a vast array of yellows, oranges, reds, and even a few pinks in there, towering over the spread of leaves on stems that soon dry hard and brown, and thus need to be pulled to keep the plants looking presentable. As the blooms are finishing the bottom layer of leaves begin to dry and die so they need to be trimmed. Friday morning turned into Friday afternoon and into shorts and t-shirt apparel. I could feel the sun burn forming on the back of my neck but it was such a lovely day and it felt good to be able to get down and dirty. It was the first time that the gardens got an end to end weeding, pulling out the obvious culprits and being able to dig into the ones hiding amidst the plants themselves. The soil was getting turned over and despite the eventual cramping of my hands because of vanking on all the spent stacks, it was a beautiful day of bending and getting on hands and knees. As the early afternoon started fading into later afternoon, my pace definitely began to slow, and the pauses between plants began to get longer. After I chased the rascally rabbit across the parking lot (Let's be honest, it wasn't much of a chase – he would take a few hops, stop, look back at me taunting me into a race -off - I would feign a sprint until he left eh vicinity). At last the last of the stems and leaves were raked up and put into the wheelbarrow and deposited into the dumpster. I sat down on the couch very self-satisfied and content that the job was finally done. I breathed a big sigh of relief and slept the sleep of the just; that was until the next morning. The first indication of the woes to come was the pain of crawling out of bed, struggling to lift my legs into the shower, and the agony of descending the stairs. The quads, hamstrings, calves, lower back, and arms and hands were all in revolt like some great conspiracy of getting even with me, making me pay dearly, for their

gross underuse and then their excessive overuse. But perhaps it is Mother Nature reminding me I'm not in control, and just as summer disappears into fall, youth disappears into those autumn years, well maybe late summer years, but who's counting. Where does the time go?

First Communion Registrations
