PANDEMIC PROTOCOL

CHURCHES REMAIN OPEN AT 15% CAPACITY

(updated April 8, 2021)

Under ONTARIO REGULATION 11/21, section 3 religious gatherings are allowed and residents of Ontario may leave their homes to attend religious gatherings. "Attending a gathering for the purpose of a wedding, a funeral or a religious service, rite or ceremony that is permitted under the Stage 1 Order or making necessary arrangements for the purpose of such a gathering".

Therefore within the Diocese of Hamilton, religious services, weddings and funerals are allowed but are restricted to 15% capacity of the room.

Sacramental Preparation



Today's reading from the Gospel of John is

proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter in each of the lectionary cycles. This fact alone should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus that are described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit, but in bodily form. We do not know, however, exactly what this form looked like. Earlier in John's Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the risen Jesus, she did not recognize him until he spoke to her. In Luke's Gospel, the disciples walking along the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in his resurrected form, Jesus was not bound by matter; he appeared to the disciples inside a home even though the door was locked. Yet the disciples could still touch the marks of his Crucifixion.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun; as Jesus was sent by God, so Jesus sends his disciples. He gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be able to accomplish this task. Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share forgiveness and reconciliation with others.

Thomas, the doubting disciple in today's reading, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. Our human nature seeks hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to his disciples after his death is indeed the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative in obtaining this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe.

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday

APRIL 11, 2021 - SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

Celebrating God's Merciful Love

In the Jubilee Year 2000, Pope John Paul II proclaimed that from that year forward the Second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday. This was proclaimed at the Canonization Mass of St. Faustina Kawalska, who worked throughout her life to make all aware of the merciful love of God. St. Faustina (1905–1938) was born and raised in Poland. Following a vocation to religious life, she was accepted by the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. As a member of the Congregation, she worked as a cook, gardener, and porter. In her spiritual life, her contemplation on the Mercy of God led her to develop a childlike trust in God and deep love for her neighbor.

In her years in the convent, St. Faustina heard a call from God to make God's mercy known to the world so that the world may more fully receive God's healing grace. St. Faustina promoted the Chaplet of Divine Mercy which consists of the recitation of prayers to the Eternal Father with the use of the rosary for the sake of Christ's sorrowful passion.

The Chaplet is prayed as follows:

- 1 Begin with the Sign of the Cross, one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed.
- 2 On the Our Father beads, recite the following: "Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."
- 3 On the <u>ten Hail Mary beads</u>, say the following: "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- 4 Repeat steps two and three for all five decades of the rosary.
- 5 Conclude by reciting three times:

"Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

When celebrating Divine Mercy Sunday, the faithful are called to reflect more personally on the graces won through the life, death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. In this way their hearts may be more fully aware of the mercy of God for them personally and for the sake of the world.

Absolution – The full text of the absolution given by the priest is:

"God, the Father of mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself and sent the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God give you pardon and peace, and I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Included in this text are several important messages:

- 1. Forgiveness comes from the mercy of God.
- 2. Reconciliation takes place through the death and resurrection of Jesus.
- 3. The presence of the Holy Spirit among us is a sign of God's forgiveness.
- 4. The Church plays a role in the extension of God's forgiveness to us.
- 5. The priest acts as judge of the person's sincerity in seeking forgiveness.
- 6. Forgiveness is granted in the name of the three persons of the Trinity.

Next month, April 25th observes the feast day of our patron, Saint Mark. But just who is our patron saint?

4th Installment – St. Mark Parish Motto

The gospels of St. Mark, St. Matthew and St. Luke record many of the same incidents in the mission of Jesus and repeat some of the same teaching parables He used. For example, everyone is familiar with the parable of the seed scattered by the sower landing on different soils and yielding various success.

But there is another unique Markan 'scattered seed' story which has yielded our parish motto: The "... seed is sprouting and growing". [Mk. 4:27]. [Jesus] said, "This is how it is with the Kingdom of God: it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how. Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come." [Mk. 4:26-29]

The apostles did not understand this parable at the time; the sower does not understand how the growth occurs; the teacher does not know how the teaching creates spiritual growth in the listeners. Scholars explain that Jesus is saying God holds many mysteries which He will reveal at the appropriate time and He hints at the coming of the Holy Spirit who will reveal truths, including Jesus is the Messiah, that He will die to redeem sinners, and that His salvation will be for Gentiles as well as Jews.

The oldest and shortest of the four gospels, St. Mark's emphasizes Jesus' rejection by humanity while being God's triumphant envoy. Mark's gospel is the gradual manifestation of a 'scandal': a crucified Messiah.
