- St. Marie of the Incarnation Marie Guyart was born in Tours, France, on October 28, 1599. By the time she was only 19 years old, she was a widow with a 6-month-old child. Penniless, she went to live with her family and took care of the education of young Claude. Eventually getting back on her feet, her prayer life grew stronger and in 1631, at the age of 32, her sister looked after her son who was by then 12 years old, and she entered the novitiate of the monastery of the Ursulines of Tours, taking the name of Marie of the Incarnation. Eight years later, in 1639, her superiors invited her to respond to her conviction that God was calling her to Canada, there "to create a house for Jesus and Mary." Travelling with 5 other sisters and a wealthy woman, Madeleine Chauvigny de la Peltrie, she arrived in Quebec and was never to return to France. She organized the building of a small monastery for the consecrated community and a boarding school for Indian and French girls and she welcomed and fed the Huron and Algonquin adults who knocked at the door; she gave them Christian instruction and encouraged them to share the Good News with their communities. She also created dictionaries, grammars, catechisms and prayer books in four First Nations languages. Writing to her son, who later joined the Benedictine Order, she wrote, "Why should one hesitate to lose oneself in Him who seeks to, and will, purify us if we abandon ourselves to Him? ... It gives me much more pleasure to love and attend to Him than to stop to consider my baseness and my unworthiness." Marie of the Incarnation died in Quebec on April 30, 1672. She was beatified by Pope (now Saint) John Paul II on June 22, 1980 and canonized by Pope Francis on April 3, 2014.
- St. Joseph has two feast days on the liturgical calendar. The first is March 19 Joseph, the Husband of Mary. The second is May 1 Joseph, the Worker. Since Joseph does not appear in Jesus' public life, at his death, or resurrection, many historians believe Joseph had probably died before Jesus entered public ministry. To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker in 1955.
- St. Athanasius was a bishop and doctor of the church. He is called the "Father of Orthodoxy," the "Pillar of the Church" and "Champion of Christ's Divinity." Athanasius became one of the most dedicated opponents of the heresy of Arianism. Much of his life was a testimony to the divinity of Jesus Christ.
- St. Philip and St. James The Apostle Philip was one of Christ's first disciples, called soon after his Master's baptism in the Jordan. St. James the Less, a brother of the Apostle Jude, was of Cana of Galilee. He is the author of one of the Catholic Epistles in the New Testament. He was favored by an appearance of the Risen Christ (I Cor. 15:7). After the dispersion of the Apostles he was made Bishop of Jerusalem. He was visited by St. Paul (Gal. 1:19). He spoke after Peter at the meeting of the Apostles (Acts 15:13). When he refused to deny the Divinity of Christ, the Jews cast him down from the terrace of the temple and clubbed him to death.

Today's reading, from the Gospel of John, is proclaimed on the second Sunday of Easter in each of the three Sunday Lectionary cycles. This should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit but in bodily form. We do not know exactly what this form was like. Earlier in John's Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the risen Jesus, she did not recognize the figure standing before her until Jesus spoke her. In Luke's Gospel, the disciples walking on the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in his resurrected body, Jesus was no longer bound by space; he appeared to the disciples in spite of the locked door. And yet, on this resurrected body, the disciples could still observe the marks of his Crucifixion.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus also commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun. As Jesus was sent by God, so too does Jesus send his disciples. This continuity with Jesus' own mission is an essential element of the Church. Jesus grants the means to accomplish this mission when he gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit binds us together as a community of faith and strengthens us to bear witness to Jesus' Resurrection.

Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Forgiveness and reconciliation are gifts to us from Jesus. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share these with others. This is another essential aspect of what it means to be Christ's Church. The Church continues Jesus' ministry of forgiveness and reconciliation.

Thomas, the disciple who doubts, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of disciples. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. It is part of our human nature to seek hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to the disciples after his death is, indeed, the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative who obtains this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who had died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed for we have not seen and yet have believed.

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday APRIL 28 – SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

The 11:30 a.m. Mass this Sunday will end with the Blessed Sacrament being exposed in the church until 3:00 pm. for Divine Mercy Devotions and Benediction.

Divine Mercy Sunday: Celebrating God's Merciful Love

In the Jubilee Year 2000, Pope John Paul II proclaimed that from that year forward the Second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday. This was proclaimed at the Canonization Mass of St. Faustina Kawalska, who worked throughout her life to make all aware of the merciful love of God. St. Faustina (1905–1938) was born and raised in Poland. Following a vocation to religious life, she was accepted by the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy.

As a member of the Congregation, she worked as a cook, gardener, and porter. In her spiritual life, her contemplation on the Mercy of God led her to develop a childlike trust in God and deep love for her neighbor.

In her years in the convent, St. Faustina heard a call from God to make God's mercy known to the world so that the world may more fully receive God's healing grace. St. Faustina promoted the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, which consists of the recitation of prayers to the Eternal Father with the use of the rosary for the sake of Christ's sorrowful passion.

The Chaplet is prayed as follows:

- 1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross, one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed.
- 2. On the <u>Our Father beads</u>, recite the following: "Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."
- 3. On the <u>ten Hail Mary beads</u>, say the following: "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world"
- 4. Repeat steps two and three for all five decades.
- 5. Conclude by reciting three times:

 "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- St. (Pope) John Paul II died on the Eve of Divine Mercy Sunday on April 2, 2005.
