The visit of the Magi occurs directly before the story of the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. Matthew's Gospel tells a version of Jesus' birth that is different than the one in Luke. Of the actual birth of Jesus, Matthew tells us little more than, "When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod . . . " The story of the census is found only in Luke's Gospel, but we hear about the visit of the Magi only in Matthew's Gospel which tells us that Jesus was no longer in the manger but now a child at home. "They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage." Although we do not know the exact age of Jesus, it is believed that he was under the age of 2 (because of Herod order to kill boys under the age of 2) and no longer an infant but a child.

We know little about the Magi. They come from the East and journey to Bethlehem, following an astrological sign, so we believe them to be astrologers. We assume that there were three Magi based upon the naming of their three gifts. The Gospel does not say how many Magi paid homage to Jesus. In Matthew's Gospel, they represent the Gentiles' search for a savior. Because the Magi represent the entire world, they also represent our search for Jesus.

We have come to consider the gifts they bring as a foreshadowing of Jesus' role in salvation. We believe the meaning of the gifts to be Christological. Gold is presented as representative of Jesus' kingship. Frankincense is a symbol of his divinity because priests burned the substance in the Temple. Myrrh, which was used to prepare the dead for burial, is offered in anticipation of Jesus' death.

The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or "showing forth." Historically several moments in Christ's early life and ministry have been celebrated as "epiphanies," including his birth in Bethlehem, the visit of the Magi, his baptism by John, and his first miracle at Cana. ■

When does the Christmas Season end?

We all know that Christmas officially begins on Christmas Eve, but when does Christmas officially end? The answer gets a bit complicated . . .

On January 6th, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Epiphany but in most places such as Canada and the U.S., this feast is transferred to the Sunday between January 2nd and January 8th. Therefore, many believe that this is the date when the Christmas season officially ends, being the end of the traditional 12 days of Christmas.

However, according to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar, Ordinary Time doesn't officially begin until the Monday after the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on the Sunday after the Epiphany. This means that the Christmas season actually extends beyond the popular "Twelve Days of Christmas" and this year ends on Sunday, January 13th.

In the older tradition of the Church, Christmas lasts until Candlemas, or the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Presentation of the Lord, which isn't until February 2^{nd} . This marked the end of a long 40-day "Christmastide" that corresponded to the 40 days of Lent. On February 2^{nd} the Church celebrates the day that Mary entered the temple with the Child Jesus when her days of purification after giving birth were fulfilled, according to the Mosaic law, and when Simeon made his well-known prophecy about Mary and the Child. It is historically called "Candle-mas" because of Simeon's prophecy of Jesus being a light for the Gentiles. Today it is better known as the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord.
