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THE MOVIES WITHIN!

I'm a bit of a movie buff. No, I don't know most actors by name - as I do well just to remember my own some days - but I do love a good movie and would have to admit that I've seen plenty of them. As I tend to watch movies alone, I used to like the idea of renting movies and watching them at my leisure when the day is done and there's nothing else I'm supposed to do, (though there's always something that needs doing). I see myself as one who has a relatively good sense of humour but I don't care much for comedies as most of them wouldn't catch the lone movie watcher laughing out loud even once through a whole flick. Rare is the film that can make me laugh out loud in the midst of my solitary movie gazing. I also don't care much for sci-fi stuff because much of it is way too far out there. Heck, the strangest stuff we could ever imagine makes the daily news not the box office.

My preference in movies tends to be in the area of drama for these are more often than not based on real-life stories and situations and draws me the viewer into the story. Drama's make me think and have the potential power to have me continue to reflect upon the issues and the principals portrayed. I will never forget the way I felt when I first saw the movie The Mission way back in 1986, a movie the IMDb described as Eighteenth century Spanish Jesuits try to protect a remote South American tribe in danger of falling under the rule of pro-slavery Portugal. The story and the cinematography combined with Ennio Morricone's hauntingly beautiful musical score left me and the whole audience motionless and speechless as the movie credits ascended the blackened screen at the movie's end.

There was the movie *Romero* which came out in 1989 about the life of Archbishop Oscar Romero who peacefully sought to resist and fight against the tyranny of the repressive military regime in El Salvador which in the end cost him his life. The Archbishop was shot to death as he celebrated Mass. Again, the music of this film lingers in my memory still as it supports the sense, the feeling left from the movie of the high cost of human suffering in the world and the heroic holiness of those who resist the current of evil which costs them their life.

Yet another more recent film was the movie from 2012, *For Greater Glory*, with an all-star cast which covered the true story of the 1920's Cristero's war that took place in Mexico when the state turned against the Catholic Church, murdering priests and punishing anyone who would not submit to the military forces. The movie exposes a young boy who joined in the pursuit of truth and faith and was in fact killed for it, making him in time a recognized, canonized Saint and Martyr of the Catholic Church, Jose Sanchez del Rio. Our own Cardinal Archbishop, Thomas Collins, has stated that this young Saint from the last century is one who has won his admiration for his great suffering and heroism in not betraying Christ. His final words before they executed him were, "Long live Christ the King!"

Gone are the days of going out to rent a movie which included walking up and down the aisles of some considerably large stores in hopes of choosing a movie or two for home viewing. When the big stores began to close I remember thinking, "What will we do now?" Yet in time one venue is replaced by another and now there is Netflix and others who supply or oversupply our appetite for movie watching to the point where whole series of TV shows can be watched in what is referred to as a 'binge'. DVD's are already becoming a thing of the past.

What gives me pause for contemplation and some concern is the high volume of "Horror" movies. There are plenty of movies among both the new releases and the 'oldies' films that I would classify as replacements for our pent up frustrations as a society. Why would people pay to go to the show or rent a movie that would scare the living daylights out of them or put you, the audience, in the midst of some truly creepy scenes the likes of which bad, bad dreams are made of?

Movies about catastrophes, evil, the devil, murder, war and mayhem, darkness personified and you pretty well name it, are the stuff so many movies are made of today. And it makes one wonder what the movie makers and the movie goers are looking to achieve or satisfy. Obviously the movie makers are out to make a buck - that is, after all, their business – but what of the watchers. If a truly good movie can inspire what is the point of one which fills us with images of terror, violence and evil? Fulton Sheen once said that if we have finally denied hell and the reality of the devil and evil, then evil had to go somewhere, so it went into human hearts and came out in the movies we watch about catastrophe, disaster, murder, violence, gore and a sense of hopelessness.

I realize that movie watching is subject to personal taste and that a movie I would love and appreciate would be considered as boring by someone else. However, when one looks back at the great movies of all time, their timelessness comes from the impact of the eternals truths they reflect of beauty, goodness, decency, loyalty, courage and faith. *(Fr.
