LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Pius Alejo* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Pius Alejo is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.

ADVENT: WHAT TO DO?

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Advent is already upon us and I'm sure most parishioners already have oodles of plans to make and commitments to fulfill. Yet if we choose now to take advantage of what Advent has to offer us – what Christ has to offer us – then we will find our celebration richer and more meaningful beyond the exhaustion which often follows.

Here are some things you can decide to do for yourself.

- 1. **Go to weekday Mass** once or twice a week.
- Attend the weekly Holy Hour of silent, beautiful, peaceful prayer before the exposed Host. (Friday mornings from 7:30 – 8:30 am followed by Mass)
- 3. **Read a passage of scripture** each day from one of the Gospels, particularly St. Matthew's Gospel since this is the Gospel we will hear proclaimed in this Year A in the cycle of readings on Sundays.
- Look over the Sunday readings before you go to Mass. This will better enable you to hear the Word of God.
- 5. **Pray the Rosary** every day.
- 6. **Prepare to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation** (Confession) during the season of Advent, before Christmas... and try not to wait until the last minute.

(Take a copy of the Examination of Conscience home with you for this preparation.)

- 7. **Make a Good Confession.** Do not be afraid of this challenging yet freeing, satisfying sacrament that brings us directly in touch with Jesus' forgiveness.
- 8. **Pray.** Speak to God when you rise in the morning, throughout your day when alone and before you go to bed. Life is filled with distractions for everyone. Take the time and simply say to Jesus wherever you are: Jesus, it's me. Thank you for.... Help me with.... Show yourself to me today....

I have always thought that the Advent we enter into will determine the Christmas we celebrate. The Church reminds us not to anticipate Christmas too much before it comes. Entering into Advent at a time when everyone has already been gearing up for Christmas is certainly a challenge but the beauty of this joyful Advent season isn't in preparing for December 24th and 25th with the exhaustion that often follows but seizing the opportunity to let Advent and its message, its readings and its active 'waiting' teach us about waiting for Jesus' birth in us at the Christmas celebrations as well as preparing our heads and hearts for the Second Coming of Jesus. For the prepared, waiting soul talk of Jesus' return isn't and should not be bad news or a scary event or even something to be feared, but rather a waiting for the arrival of Someone deeply known, One who loves us, and the One who promises us home with Him forever. It is for this reason that we can and do pray in Advent, "Come, Lord Jesus!"

THE ADVENT WREATH: Some Common Questions

From the First Sunday of Advent through to the Fourth Sunday of Advent, progressively a single candle is lit as a way of counting down our time of Advent waiting. Perhaps you've seen different versions of an Advent Wreath and candles and wondered about the differences.

Four or Five Candles?



Traditionally, in Catholic churches, the Advent Wreath has just four candles, though we've all seen five candles on some wreathes. There are 3 purple candles and one rose or pink coloured candle. The order of the candles and

their lighting on each subsequent Sundays of Advent is Purple, Purple, Pink and then Purple. The pink candle reminds us (in case we forgot) that this is a season of joy, not sadness. Our Saviour is coming! The third Sunday when the rose or pink candle is lit is called Gaudete Sunday, which comes from the introduction of the Mass and means "Rejoice!"

The Advent Wreath, since it represents our waiting for the coming of the Lord at Christmas and at the end of time, has four candles, one for each of the four Sundays until Christmas. The entire Advent season is a season of joy and is not penitential in nature (as is Lent) though preparing to go to confession before Christmas is an obviously good and even necessary thing to prepare for the Feast of Christ's Birth. With the arrival of Christmas, our Advent waiting is over, therefore, in Catholic churches we remove the Advent Wreath after the Fourth Sunday and shortly after enter into the celebration of the Birth of Jesus the Messiah, Christmas.

In many Protestant churches their wreathes have five candles with a white candle placed in the center of the wreath representing the birth of Jesus. In this case, the wreath is not only considered as representing waiting but also fulfillment. With our parish's lavish and abundant Christmas decorating in the church, having the Advent Wreath present in the midst of it all would start to feel like *Where's Waldo?*

The origin of the Advent Wreath dates back to the middle ages. The winter months were times of longer nights and shorter days and, therefore, candle-use was extended through the darkness. There were pagan customs of making a wheel and placing candles on it symbolizing their desire that the god of light would steer the wheel of darkness back to warmer and brighter and longer days. As with so many pagan customs, Christians took them over to overshadow the false beliefs of many gods (pagan) to the One God of Jesus Christ. The Germanic peoples changed the wheel of light into use in Advent to symbolize the waiting for Christ the Light and was brought to North America in the 18th century. (FrC)
