# **ADVENT: WHAT TO DO? Part II**

Advent is not a penitential season in that it is primarily a season of joy in preparation for the coming of Christ. When? At any moment, in looking back in history to the birth of Jesus, in looking to His promise that He would return at a time not of our knowing – at an unexpected hour - and that He comes to us now in the today moment of our lives. "Jesus came in history, Jesus comes in mystery and He will come again at the end of time, the end of the world" is an old saying which summarizes the three comings of the Lord.

And yet, in the Church as Catholics we know that one of the greatest forms of response to Jesus is to be prepared for



Him.

And the way we do it is the way the whole Old Testament people were told how to do it, repent. John the Baptist, one of the principal figures of the Advent season in the scriptures we will hear is so focused on the mission he has been foretold to do, for even through the Prophet Isaiah we hear: "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make

his paths straight." Yet first, as John fulfills his heaven-sent mandate to point to Christ, the Messiah, he himself tells the people, as he appears in the desert as a dishevelled looking figure, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." Repent, or 'turn your life around' is to recognize ones sin and seek to get rid of it. And Christ Our Blessed Lord gave us a way out through his priests in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, or confession. We make a path that is straight and without winds and curves, hills and potholes so that the image of making a straight path for Christ to come into your heart means to ready that heart and the path that leads to it as straight and even as possible.

There are so many paintings of St. John the Baptist and in many of them John cuts a handsome figure as he stands in the Jordan about to baptize Jesus. But the Gospels tell us that he would have appeared as a strange man indeed. His diet is eating locusts (bugs) and wild honey. He appeared in the wilderness and remained there most of the time as the people went out to see him and heed his words of repentance. I've always pictured him as a slimmer, rough and wild looking Fred Flintstone with caveman-like clothing. As a biblical figure, John the Baptist appears as strange in many ways to the people he was sent to call out to. He is bold and unafraid in many instances yet he can speak gently and powerfully about the fact that he himself is not the Messiah, but the one who prepares the way of the Messiah and expected Saviour.

And even though John is tenacious and persistent, he himself, experiences his own doubts as to whether Jesus is the One who will fulfill the prophecies of God's Messiah? Having been thrown in prison, John sends some of his disciples to Jesus to ask Him whether He is the Messiah or should they look for someone else? Jesus, unlike any other man who might simply answer the question with an affirmative "yes", doesn't give a yes or no answer at all. Rather, he tells John's messengers to relay to John, "The blind see, the deaf hear, the lame walk, the dead are raised and the good news is proclaimed!" In other words, tell John that this is the proof that the Messiah has come. We will note that in all of the Gospels Jesus never plainly says "I am the Messiah". His works, His words, His miracles and His teaching stand alone as the evidence of who He is. Often enough, the demons would recognize who Jesus was and would proclaim it aloud, but Jesus would immediately silence them. Why? Because, as in your and my life and that of the apostles and all disciples of Jesus, He is to be proclaimed as Saviour by those who have come to believe. Just think on the many figures in the Gospels and in the New Testament as a whole who came to believe that Jesus was from God. The centurion, after he thrusts the spear into Jesus' side as he hung upon the cross dead, immediately said, after seeing how Jesus died, "Truly, this man was God's Son!" The thief on Jesus' right said, "Remember me when you come into your kingdom".



Mary and Joseph must have contemplated constantly on the greatness and mystery of their Son who with them lived this obscure life in relative poverty. The greatest knowing amidst such a simple poor life on the earth, that Jesus was part of with them.

John the Baptist, even with his doubts about Jesus at one time, would in the end prove resolute and faithful to his call to make the Messiah known. Yet, how is it possible that God who can do all things and who told Mary plainly through an angel that God had a plan to save the world through her, used a man like John to point with his very life to Jesus? "He must increase; I must decrease", said John of Jesus. Often John was thought to be the Messiah, which is a great compliment to his integrity and bold service to God, just as a Christian can be labelled as a follower of Jesus by the life they are living.

Advent, which to be honest seems to pale in its power to compete with the flash and dazzle of a pre-celebrated Christmas so often void of the One who is its meaning, is actually alike to the faithful voice of John, who once said of Jesus: "Behold, the Lamb of God....". (Fr. Charles)

# **The Immaculate Conception** of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This year's Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the solemn dogma defined by Blessed Pope Pius IX in 1854, was transferred from the 8th because of the

Sunday Liturgy. Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Blessed Pope Pius IX proclaimed on December 8, 1854: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Saviour of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin."
