All families attending St. Leo's are requested to register with the parish. Registration forms are available in the vestibule of the church.

LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Pius Alejo* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Pius Alejo is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.



NEW OFFICE RECEPTION WINDOW

If any of our parishioners were to visit a local Catholic parish office you would find that the secretary is hard at work in the background and comes to welcome and greet visitors at a reception

window. Gone are the days when a visitor who has come to get parish envelopes, to register in the parish or to get a Mass card walks right into the office working area to do so, and for good reason. Parish secretaries and Office Managers are kept busy with so many different tasks that attending to the reception end of the position is only a small part of the hefty amount of office work to be done. They take care of all the financial end of the running of the parish, paying bills, keeping financial records, inputting the Sunday offertory donations, issuing income tax receipts, preparing the bulletin, schedule meetings, answer phone calls and email inquiries, receiving guests for appointments and many, many other tasks.

RECEPTION WINDOWS

All of the work they do requires confidentiality as they are working with the parishioners' personal information and, therefore, are charged with protecting all office materials. For this reason alone, a *walk-into-the-office* situation can no longer exist and is why most if not all parishes are installing reception windows in the parish office. This preserves all confidential materials the secretary might be working on from the eyes of anyone visiting. In our parish's former office set up, visitors entered right into the office area and leaned over a wall to get Mass cards or speak to the secretary. Meanwhile, they were looking right over the secretaries desk which would be scattered with all manner of private and confidential documentation and paperwork, not to mention the computer screen visibly seen. It forced the secretary to cover up whatever she was working on in order to attend to visitors.

OUR RECEPTION WINDOW

Our parish has now installed a Reception Window to the right of the main office door. The window frame itself was originally installed when the church was built but was not used. We had a carpenter install a shelf at the reception window both for the secretary inside the window and for those visiting on the outside. Forms may be filled out here and there is an ample window opening at the bottom to pass items and documents back and forth. While it never feels quite right speaking to another person through a plate of glass and a couple of holes

This new arrangement also provides security for the parish as the secretary works alone in the office area itself. Outside of the need for those coming into the office for appointments, the office door is locked. Awhile back we began locking the outside door leading to the office and all visitors who identify themselves are then buzzed into the outer office area. Now they will simply proceed to the office reception window and have their needs attended to there.

I am sure it will take all of us – parishioners, the Office Manager and me – some time to get used to speaking to the Office Manager through a kiosk window but in the long run it

will allow the secretary to attend to her many and varied tasks while still meeting the needs of visiting parishioners. I would ask for the patience of all involved as we move to make our office work more efficiently and safe while ensuring the service component of the new reception window.

I would like to extend a special note of appreciation to *Fairview Glass Limited*, owned and operated by parishioners, who kindly donated the materials and installation of the glass reception window.

OFFICE HOURS

For over two years now we have had new office hours and the office has been closed on Friday's, as is the case in many parishes. Parish secretaries work 35-hour weeks (and then some) and have so many items to attend to apart from the phones and email correspondence. That is why the office hours are shorter than the hours the secretary is working so that the many tasks which demand care and attention will be accomplished from week to week.

RESPECTING THE LUNCH HOUR

The Office Manager is entitled to an hour for lunch but to this day there are many who come to the office during the lunch hour from 12 noon to 1 pm. The office hours are clearly marked at the office door (and below) as well as on the front cover of our parish's weekly bulletin. The office closes each day from Monday to Friday at 3 pm. so that the secretary can complete her work uninterrupted for the day before the end of the day.

Just a friendly reminder that the office hours are as follows:

MONDAY TO THURSDAY 9:00 AM. TO 3:00 PM.

LUNCH TIME: 12 NOON TO 1 PM. (1 HOUR)

THE OFFICE IS ALWAYS CLOSED ON FRIDAY

Obviously the 20 hours the parish office is open to the public each week is ample time for parishioners and visitors to access the office. As our parish continues to grow we may look into the possibility of hiring students at times other than the regular office hours to meet the expanding access needs of our parish.
