LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Pius Alejo* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Pius Alejo is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.

The Eucharistic Prayers and Praying for the Dead

There are a total of eight Eucharistic Prayers found in the Roman Missal, that large, red covered book that is used at the altar by the priest during the Mass. The Eucharistic Prayer consists of the words the priest prays following the singing of the "Holy, Holy, Holy" to the conclusion of the Doxology, "Through Him and with Him and in Him....," Within each Eucharistic Prayer is found the words of consecration over the bread and separately over the wine, changing them by the power of the Holy Spirit into the Body and Blood of Christ. Following the consecration, the priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer with the words that ask God to help us to become one by the gift of the Eucharist, ask God to remember the Church, the pope, the bishops, the clergy and all of God's people. We remember and pray for the dead and ask God that we might see the reality and glorious blessing of heaven and live with the Lord forever.

Specifically, though, when we remember the dead we pray for two groups of the dead (Euch. Pr. II):

"Remember also our brothers and sisters

1) who have fallen asleep in the hope of the resurrection,

2) and all who have died in your mercy".

So, we don't just pray for all people who have died but for those who died as believers in Jesus' Resurrection (Group 1) and all the dead to be brought before Jesus' mercy, (Group 2). In the Mass, therefore, we not only pray for those who were Christians, baptized into the Lord's death and resurrection, but we also pray for all people the world over who have died and didn't believe in Jesus, but died in Jesus' mercy.

This, of course, raises the question about whether God wants all people, universally, to be baptized, and the simple answer is, yes. At the end of Mark's Gospel, on the day Jesus rose from the dead, He appeared first to Mary of Magdala who in turn took the incredible, joyful news to Jesus' followers and to two of His followers on the road to Emmaus, and finally to His 11 Apostles who, apparently, were slow to believe what had been told them about Jesus being alive and Risen from the dead:

"Afterwards while the Eleven were at table he appeared to them and reproached them for their incredulity and dullness, because they had not believed those who had seen him after he was raised from the dead.

Then he said to them, 'Go forth to every part of the world, and proclaim the Good News to the whole creation. Those who believe it and receive baptism will find salvation; those who do not believe will be condemned."

As I mentioned in last week's bulletin, Baptism is not an option to being saved by Jesus Christ – it is necessary. In an

age where more and more people don't want to bother having their children baptized much less live a life of faith in Jesus, baptism is like being offered a lifeboat whilst you are standing on a sinking ship and saying, "I don't believe my child needs the lifeboat; their fine with me on the ship."

Baptism isn't a nicety to merely please grandma and grandpa and mom and dad – it is the offer of life forever itself that is offered and made necessary by Jesus.

In Luke's Gospel account, it ends with Jesus specifically instructing His apostles of what they are commissioned to do in His name after He ascends to the Father:

"The eleven disciples made their way to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to meet him. When they saw him, they fell prostrate before Him, though some were doubtful. Jesus then came up and spoke to them. He said, 'Full authority in heaven and on earth has been committed to me. Go forth therefore and make all nations my disciples; baptize men everywhere in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, and teach them to observe all that I have commanded you."

So, Baptism isn't just a nice one-day wonder or a good luck charm for heaven, but is *necessary* for heaven. Yet, even to those who have not been baptized, perhaps through no fault of their own, the mercy of God can do anything. God is God and we are not God. Ultimately, God, who knows the hearts of all people, knows what we truly desired at our core that may not be known by any other. As it so beautifully is found in the Old Testament Book of Samuel: (Sam. 16:7b)

"The Lord does not see as man sees; men judge by appearances but the Lord judges by the heart."

The danger is that we might be led to 'presume' God will be merciful, kind, loving, forgiving, when we die and go before His judgement. This is why it is the mandate under God to all shepherds that they not only care for souls but seek them out, that they would come to know the God who loves them and desires only that they live with Him now, in this life, and in the fullness of the life with Him that is to come in heaven.

Therefore, in the highest form of prayer in the Church – the Mass – we bring all of the dead, both our brothers and sisters baptized in and who have lived the faith, as well as all who are known to God alone, into the Kingdom of heaven.

I remember a priest (but not his name or where or when I heard it) say that if you were invited to attend a wedding through an invitation (baptism) and you replied with the words that you planned to attend and you wrote the date in your calendar, if the date of the wedding comes and you did not get in your car and drive to the wedding, the end result is that you will not end up at the wedding – by your own choice and of your own volition. If the trajectory of your life is aimed toward the hope of heaven, then you need to be headed in that direction now! If not, why not? (*Fr. Charles*)
