DECORATING THE CHURCH FOR CHRISTMAS: IT'S A LOT OF WORK

Once again this Christmas the church sanctuary was a sight to behold. No, we're not in competition with other parishes in the way they might prepare their church environment for the celebration of the Birth of Our Messiah, Jesus Christ; we simply want to decorate our worship space in a way that is worthy of Our Great Saviour and to do Him just homage. Our parish, in some remote way, advanced toward that goal in the decorations for this year.

The canvas we had to work with was already greatly changed with the recent painting of the sanctuary walls with warm, earthy colours. The new sacred image of Christ Crucified at the center of the sanctuary wall is such a moving reflection of Jesus' ultimate cost in saving us – His death on that Cross – the very reason He was born and came into this world, to die for our sins and to put to death, death forever for those who have come to believe in Him. All else in decorations was only to frame and point to that reality between the Christmas Crib and the Cross of Calvary.

At first sight, it might appear that set up for the church at Christmas is simply a matter of setting things out like the manger, the flowers and the trees, but in reality the setting up of the church takes place over days and with many hours of work and planning.

<u>STEP 1.</u> All of the Christmas decorations, trees, wreathes, lights and various materials need to be taken out of storage. <u>STEP 2.</u> The Christmas trees need to be unpacked from their boxes, assembled and 'fluffed' to make them appear full and 'real'. The wreathes also are fluffed to appear full and round.

<u>STEP 3.</u> This is the actual day of assembling all the various parts of trees, wreathes, the manger and its figures in the various areas of our large sanctuary and on this day the ordered poinsettia flowers arrive. The areas to be decorated are the manger, the statue of Our Lady, the altar itself and the altar area as well as the Tabernacle. This year we spent about 9-hours from start to finish of the sanctuary set-up on the Friday before Christmas.

<u>STEP 4.</u> The set-up of the extra chairs in the church for the overflow crowds of Christmas Eve which is usually done by the Knights of Columbus the day before Christmas or following the last Mass of the 4th Sunday of Advent.

The key to good decorating for Christmas is to keep your decorations proportional to the size and shape of the church sanctuary itself. With a large, wide sanctuary like ours, small decorations and flowers would appear sparse and puny compared to the large space. The flowers, manger figures as well as the number of trees must be in keeping with the vast size of the space to be decorated. Materials used, since they adorn the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and God's House, should be of good quality and worthy of the reality and presence of our God.

This year, more than ever before, so many people went forward to the foot of the sanctuary area following the Christmas Masses to take in the splendour of the Christmas decorating, to visit the Manger and to take pictures of the beauty that Christmas is to the Christian heart and soul.

<u>STEP 5.</u> This is the less popular part of Christmas when we disassemble all of the Christmas decorations which adorned the sanctuary of the church and restore it to the way it was before Advent and Christmas.

The artful and important work of decorating a church for any liturgical season and celebration requires much time and effort as well as planning and team work. As pastor I am grateful for the various people who have come together once again this year to work toward making our parish church a bright reflection of the good news of our Saviours birth.

Thanks goes out also to all those who work within the various ministries in the parish and show such dedication and faithfulness to what they have been called to do.
