#### LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Pius Alejo* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Pius Alejo is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.

#### THE GIFT OF PRIESTHOOD



A couple of weeks ago, 8 marked twenty-fourth anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood of Jesus Christ. lt seems unbelievable to me that I have been ordained this long and I would imagine married couples experience the same disbelief with the quick passing of the years as Anniversaries, as well. someone once told me. are not so much a marking of the number of years since a major event occurred, but rather, they mean that "you are". This most recent

anniversary echoes this truth to me, reminding me that I am and have been called to be a priest.

In reality, this anniversary itself says to me that this was the time twenty-four years ago when the Church officially called me to the priesthood, but the journey goes back my lifetime to my spiritual beginning at baptism. It could very well be that I received the call to be a priest on the day I was baptized, for as long as I can remember I wanted to be a priest. I can recall very serious moments when I would have a bath towel slung over my shoulders and would be celebrating "Mass" on top of the TV set when I was about 4 or 5 years old. There would be snickers and chiding coming from my older siblings who were in the kitchen, but I remember the stern looks I would return in response to their seeming sacrilege on what I was doing. While those days were more imitation than knowledge about who a priest was and what his calling entailed, the sense of the nobility and the call to be a priest was very much a present reality to me even then.

I particularly remember so well the incident that happened in my grade one class at St. John the Evangelist school. (It just so happens that one of our parishioners is now the principal of that school - Mr. Robert Fortin.) Back in those days, in the early sixties, the Order of Grey Sisters we had, (now almost all the Sisters regardless of the order they belong to are literally 'grey), were already such a powerful witness and symbol of dedication to one's vocational call. I remember their long flowing habits, the large rosary beads which hung from their belts, and my early sense that nuns did not possess feet but had wheels, as they seemed to glide noiselessly down halls and across rooms. Their veil and the white brim that were visible at the top of their foreheads only assisted in perpetuating the rumours that we all had heard: that nuns were bald! Of course, I would later have this belief shattered when one day Sr. Mary Jacqueline, my grade one teacher, was leaning over my desk to check on my work. I realized that as I had moved

my hands to the sides of my desk top that her veil was under my left thumb. With full intention and mortal sin in mind I pressed my thumb firmly on the black mesh of that veil, and as she went to move on to the next student, my grasp caused her veil to pull ever so slightly to one side. There, in my disbelief of what I had actually done, I saw brown wisps of hair, proving once and for all that the rumours about bald nuns were false. If my memory serves me well, Sr. Mary Jacqueline believed my deliberate act was just an accident and I suffered no consequences for this event, though in my heart I knew, as I know now, that it was just wrong. I suppose Sr. Mary Jacqueline, now having gone to glory, knows differently and, I hope, is having a little chuckle over the truth of it all. I would think that purgatory for me would have a few months or years added to it for a little boy who would do this to a nun, but I just had to know for sure - and now I do.

The real incident I wish to recall from that grade one class with Sr. Mary Jacqueline, however, is the day she asked our class what we would like to be when we grew up. (My mother loved to tell people that I used to say, "If I grow up....".) I remember my fellow classmates, girls and boys, raising their hands and naming off professions such as a nurse, a doctor, a farmer, an astronaut, a policeman, a And I remember raising my hand and fireman, etc. pronouncing so clearly those seven simple yet profoundly prophetic words, "I WOULD LIKE TO BE A PRIEST". In hindsight, it was quite a diplomatic move to say to a Roman Catholic nun that you were destined to be a priest, for you were sure to pass on to the next grade no matter how bad your grades, or so my thinking was at the time. It wasn't so much the words themselves that struck me as they poured out of my mouth, but the truth of them and what happened after they were uttered. I remember that my heart began to pound in my little six year old chest and that I suddenly was filled with the most wonderful sensation that I can only liken to being filled with cotton candy. Today, as I look back to that incident, I had received what is called a 'witness of the Spirit', which is when God's Holy Spirit gives you a real sense of His presence and power and truth. Way back then, in that classroom of that rather small school, God had again called me and let me know that I belonged to Him.

I did pass from grade one to grade two that year, despite my lack of zeal and interest in anything that had to do with school, and I would like to think that like Jesus, I too grew in "age, grace and wisdom".

Having talked to many seminarians and priests in my life, I know that each persons vocation story is unique and personal to them and, in many ways, is not always easy to describe or define. My own experience of call has been one of many personal and memorable experiences of the power and presence of God, incidences when I just knew God was speaking to my heart and allowing me to get to know Him better and more personally. I can recall always feeling a special relationship with the Lord Jesus as being God's little boy. Thankfully, though the stresses of day to day living have changed and increased in my life as responsibilities and challenges have come my way, I have never lost that sense of being, like Mary, 'favoured'. And that sense has

led me to feel and know that no matter what happens, I belong to the Lord and I am in his hands.

Priesthood is not a martyrdom. It is a pull from above and not a push from below. Of myself, I could not simply choose to be a priest, and I've always said that "I want to be someone who is sent, not someone who just went". Having "the call" and responding to it doesn't of course mean that life will always be smooth sailing - it isn't for anybody. It does mean, however, that once again heaven has touched the earth as God's whisper can speak to the heart, and that a soul created in the image and likeness of God - even mine - has been called to make that image and likeness visible in his own, and I hope that in many ways I have.

I believe that God has not ceased calling men (and little boys) to be priests, but that His voice is so often drowned out or is not audible in a noisy world in pursuit of its own earthly desires. I thank God for the privilege and call to priesthood and have never once looked back on my own decision to say yes to that call with any sense of regret or second thoughts. It is pure gift. I am grateful also for all those priests who during my childhood and teenage years stood as models of joy and commitment in serving the Lord, and still do, especially those priests who have such an evident love and reverence for the Eucharist. The reality of doing the unimaginable through the gift of the priesthood and in touching lives even as my life continues to be touched, continues to fill me with joy and a sense of peace that I never knew was possible.

If any boy, young man or adult male who reads this and has felt the tug of the Holy Spirit calling you, don't hesitate in saying yes to the Lord for, "the Lord will not lead you where His grace will not keep you". Also, I am here for you and with you as you journey, discern and walk with the Lord. (Fr. Charles)

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
