Here is a *Glory Story* submitted this week which shows the power of prayer and the closeness of Our Blessed Lord and His Blessed Mother:

"For weeks and months, I have been struggling with the discernment of my vocation. Though I have asked God to use me wherever He pleases, I have struggled to hear where he is calling me to. Last week was a particularly confusing time for me. I was pretty sure that I was being called to the health care field, but my mind was running in circles, considering every possible pathway that might suit my skills.

Amidst this confusion, I attended the parish Lenten mission with my mom and her friend. On Monday night, we approached Mark to say thank you and my mom asked if he would pray over us. As Mark was invoking the Holy Spirit, his hands predominantly over my mom, he suddenly shifted his body towards me and placed his hands over my head. At this moment, my mom's friend smelled roses. He told me that Our Holy Mother was granting me a special grace, and then asked me if I am discerning my vocation. When I replied yes in complete and utter amazement, he told me that Our Lady wanted me to consecrate myself to her. Incidentally, I have been completing my 33-day preparation period for consecration on the Feast of the Annunciation! Mark gave me a great big hug on her behalf.

Just one day later, on the final day of the Lenten mission, I was studying in a coffee shop when a barista asked if I would like a sample of rose tea. Minutes later, I was greeted by an interview invitation e-mail to the medical program I had been hoping to get into! (Reader: Please pray for the success of my interview!) Praise be to God, and thanks be to Him for Our Holy Mother, the dispenser of graces. Finally, thank you for your ministry, Mark!"

CHRIST CRUCIFIED



In our time we are literally bombarded with so many images of Christ; some respectful, others not so much. We have the smiling Jesus pictures or the mod Jesus giving the viewer two thumbs up. We have the older images which so often presented Jesus as milky white and rather effeminate. There are the pics we've seen of Jesus walking with his disciples or scenes from the various miracles of

Jesus as well as the time-honoured painting of Jesus which appeared as truly beautiful. Yet the one image that many still find hard to fathom or even accept is Christ on the Cross, or as St. Paul referred to it, Christ crucified: "And I, when I came to you, brothers, I did not come proclaiming to you the testimony of God with lofty speech or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified." (1 Cor. 2:1) How could St. Paul possibly hold this to be true when he would have surely heard of what a scandal it was to Jesus' own disciples who fled at seeing Jesus nailed to a cross and die? Afterall, three days later Jesus in fact came back to life in what we know as the Resurrection. Shouldn't that be the focus since it is clearly the great victory of Jesus defeating death? St. Paul himself preached Christ and his Resurrection when in Athens, though he only made a handful of converts who said that they would "hear him again on this". But he had time to reflect on what he had said on the road back to Corinth. And it was on his return that he wrote his letter to them with the preceeding words of needing to know nothing among them except Christ and him crucified. The Resurrection is the fulfillment of the Cross and yet the Cross itself with Christ on it has the power to remind us how the price for each of our lives was paid. The image which seems such a defeat - Christ hanging dead on the Roman's most feared form of torture and death - is the one that people are most familiar with in churches, in art, on rosaries and most any place.

Each year on Good Friday in our parish we venerate with a bow, a kiss or a genuflection the Cross of Jesus. Yet in some places it is the crucifix itself that is shown honour and great reverence The real symbol of Good Friday is not just the cross by itself but Jesus hanging dead on it. Since Jesus replaced our punishment with his own we owe him everything for it purchased us heaven if we would but endure in this life as a faithful follower.

To our own human share of suffering, be it physical, emotional or spiritual, the thought of Christ crucified brings us a strange comfort as we know that God-Man suffered too and entered into every one of our human pains and won victory over them, the last one being death itself. Ven. Fulton J. Sheen often wrote and spoke so beautifully on the crucifix, reminding us that when we study it and



look closely at it, it is our own autobiography. He also spoke in the 70's about how (with the films Godspell and Jesus Christ Superstar) Jesus was not a superstar, but a super-scar. He said, "Jesus is not a superstar but a superscar. He was driven out of a city, out to a garbage heap, and there crucified, and not between two holy candles."

While the image for our annual Lenten journey is symbolically the Cross of Jesus it is Christ on the Cross that speaks most to our innermost thoughts and imaginings of such a great and tremendous love that goes to death, not for another, but for all who would come and kneel before the One hanging upon it who redeemed the world, defeated Satan and won for us our lives.... forever! *(Fr. Charles)*

For the past 40 years, high school youth from across North America have had their faith awakened and their hearts set on fire through a personal encounter with Jesus at Steubenville Conferences. Once again St. Leo the Great will be taking a group of excited teens and chaperones to participate in Steubenville Toronto. This amazing conference is the highlight of the year for our high school youth. Fun is an understatement, youth will not only enjoy the food, fellowship and music, they will experience praise and worship, Eucharistic Adoration and Mass fully, along with over 1,200 other teens. Talented recording artists, clergy and guest speakers are just part of what makes this event so special. Now in it's fifth year, Stubenville Toronto continues to grow and is Canada's largest Catholic youth conference. Who is eligible to go? Steubenville is open to all grades 9 thru 12, including any Grade 8's who are graduating this year and any students graduating from grade 12 this year.

Cost is \$275 per person for all 3 days. This price includes meals and accommodation at UOIT (please note: transportation to and from the venue is not included). Registration will begin April 1st and close June 7th.

We will arrive Friday afternoon and check out in the early afternoon Sunday. Words cannot express how great these conferences are, in fact life changing.
