LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Victor Amole* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Victor is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.

Some Testimonies

The following are stories I would call *Glory Stories*, about how people have discovered Christ personally in going to Mass, returning to the Church or rediscovering Christ in the Church they have known all along. Just because we go to Mass every Sunday doesn't mean we've got it all figured out, right? *(Fr. C.)*

Katie -

My journey into the Catholic Church began many years ago when at the age of 17, I responded to a newspaper advertisement for an introductory course for new Catholics. To this day I don't know why I responded. I had been brought up as an Anglican and my social life revolved around the church. One year later I met my future husband who was a Catholic.

I was received into the Catholic Church in 1966 and was married a few weeks later. On the Sunday after we returned from our honeymoon, we attended Mass, but when I went for Communion I was refused in a very public manner because I wasn't wearing any head covering. I was hurt and humiliated and I felt very insecure and uncertain.

The years that followed saw me struggling with my faith and the Church. When the last of our three sons was confirmed, our attendance fell away. However, I was always aware of a spiritual emptiness.

Some years later I started to pray and to search for a Church to belong to. I began to attend courses at the Christadelphian Church and the Seventh Day Adventist Church but was put off by their anti-Catholic standpoint. Why did I care so much when I had not been to a Catholic Church for years?

The turning point came soon after this when I was overcome by a very strong conviction that I was to return to the Catholic Church. I believe this call was Spirit led. I was very nervous about doing this alone but was introduced to the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) program which gave me spiritual guidance and surrounded me with so many wonderful people.

The culmination of my journey was my Confirmation at the Easter vigil when I was formally welcomed into full membership of the Catholic community. I was welcomed and accepted and I really felt I had come home.

It was with great joy that I went to the Lords table to receive Holy Communion. The hurt and sadness of the past years had gone and in its place came a great love for God. I am so thankful for all He has done for me.

When I was diagnosed with breast cancer I drew enormous strength and courage from reflecting on Christ's own pain and suffering for us. My recovery has been aided by participating in the Eucharist and by the tremendous support I received from fellow parishioners. I am nourished and strengthened by this to go out and serve and follow the Lord. As I have learned more about the Eucharist, my personal faith has deepened.

The 40 years since my first inquiry were my 40 years in the desert but I had come to the Promised Land. My journey continues but I now know I am going in the right direction and I just feel so blessed to be part of the Catholic community.

Melanie -

I was in great pain and saw my doctor, who rushed me into hospital, where I had tests which all turned out to be negative. The very last test was an ultra-sound. By this time I was so disturbed I took the sensor from the specialist and pressed it against my stomach where it hurt the most. What it showed so shocked the specialist that I was rushed into emergency surgery. Three days later I woke up in great pain and saw that the sheet covering me had blood on it. I lifted it and on my stomach was a colostomy bag and there were drips in my hands and nose.

I wished I had not opened my eyes; I was petrified and distressed at what had happened to my body – it was all cut up. I asked the nurse for some pain killers but she said I had already had so much morphine she couldn't give me any more. Frightened, I said to her, 'What is happening to me'. She said, 'Be quiet, you are lucky to be alive. Not many people would have survived the operation you've had.' I could see an open window and wanted to jump out of it.

I knew that Jesus had saved my life, but for what purpose I couldn't understand. I felt I could only suffer as he did. The surgeon who operated on me was Jewish and said that everything had been done and I should pray to God. My body was not healing – it was full of infection.

A nun visited me every day and prayed with me. She said there was a chapel and asked if I would like to go to Sunday Mass. I said 'Yes.' I thought I will meet with Jesus as the pain in my body was unbearable. The Sister took me to the chapel in a wheelchair with all the apparatus in my body and I saw many other sick people in wheelchairs.

At communion time I suddenly found tears running down my face although I wasn't crying. I was also anointed with the oil of healing.

I felt at peace – a peace that cannot be expressed in words. I felt loved.

Despite the tears, I was praying with joy, knowing that Jesus in the Eucharist would heal me. Strangely, I wasn't surprised. The tears washed away my pain and cleansed my sick body of the infection. *I knew I would heal.*

When the Sister took me up to the ward I felt so happy and I was not frightened any more.

I had to have two more operations and spent 12 months in and out of hospital, and everything went well.

Tina -

I am a minister of the Eucharist. One of the parishioners had just had open heart surgery that wasn't entirely successful and she had to have a second operation. As I was giving her communion the host seemed to become enlarged and I could see it pulsating and the words came into my mind 'my heart is beating with yours, don't be afraid'. I was really astonished and started to cry. The experience only lasted a minute but it was so real and beautiful. My friend is well now and busy helping her family and others.

As Catholics, we have no idea really about Who is coming to us when we receive Jesus in the Eucharist. As one Catholic speaker said, "So many Catholics come to Mass hungry and thirst for God and they leave Mass still hungry and thirst, having no idea Who it was they have just received.
