### **OUR NEW CHURCH LIGHTS**



It is indeed a great day in our parish when some of our generously given Family of Faith money has paid off now in the realization of the new LED lighting project for the church. [In our Family of Faith Campaign case statement we focused on three areas with which to focus the portion of money we would receive: Youth Ministry, Church Light Replacement and paying money toward our debt. Our campaign raised over \$860,000. which meant that 75% of the money raised beyond our target of \$390,000. would come back to our parish over the five year period of the campaign. Half of our money would go toward

our parish debt and the remainder would be distributed between youth ministry (which began this past year) and the church lighting replacement, now completed.]

Our new lighting and fixtures (Versailles - Gothic style) are appropriate and suitable for a parish such as ours with its expanse of space to be lit. LED lighting offers a substantial cost savings of hydro and does not need replacing for at least 15 + years. The fixtures themselves compliment the window framing design of our church windows and emit a warmer glow of light from the sides, top and bottom. The lights are on a 'twostage system' which means that each set of fixtures can either be fully on with light emitting from the bottom and sides or just the sides only. The former fixtures only cast light downward and were very expensive to maintain as many would burn out or fade out within months of having the bulbs and ballasts replaced. The height of the former lights also presented a significant maintenance challenge as they were close to the ceiling and the center nave lights were affixed directly over the pews, making accessibility difficult. Each of the former lights also put out a great deal of heat - 800 degrees - which made cooling of the church in the summer a constant challenge.

The lighting project has been underway since its inception two years ago. A vote of appreciation goes to Jason Smith who offered much of his time meeting with various lighting installers over time. It became apparent that while LED is a newer and most popular technology, its application in a worship space setting of a Catholic Church was a challenge. Some LED lighting presents a more white/blue colour of lighting and with the grey stone, blue and beige paint of our walls and white and blue tiling on the floor this would make for a very drab, cold feel. Also, glare was a major factor as much of the lighting options offered to us was more industrial and warehouse suited and not at all for a church, not to mention the bright light that made it difficult to focus. For me personally, bright lights can trigger migraines.

Our Finance Council also worked toward finding and approving a cost-efficient form of lighting that would enhance our church and provide superior lighting for reading, singing, prayer and most especially the Mass. We found Mills Architectural Lighting in Toronto and both their price and their expertise in church lighting persuaded us to go with them.

Last weekend, while only the lights on the north and south sides of the church had been completed, the nave (center) of the church appeared shadowy and dark, as did the sanctuary. The new lights are such a contrast to the poor lighting we had

grown accustomed to. And now the People of Light are bathed in light that helps us to better see Jesus.

I would like to thank Mr. Harry Mills of Mills Architectural Lighting for his hard work and many hours spent with us on this project. I would also like to thank parishioner Kevin Coughlin, who has a wealth of experience in construction for his continued oversight generously shared with us in his involvement in every step of this endeavor. The electricians, who worked in the church for the past two weeks, showed great respect for the church as they wrestled with the wiring challenges of our high ceilings.

I would like to thank all of our parishioners who pledged to be part of the Family of Faith campaign which has reaped visible rewards already for the good of our parish community.

### THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING THE BEGINNING AND END OF ALL THINGS

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. It is one of many opportunities the Catholic Liturgical Church year offers to each of us considering the creature which is called time, receive it as a gift and begin to really live differently.

Yet, for many Catholics who commemorate the Feast, it is just one more somewhat familiar sounding celebration which we go through every year at this time.

This mistake is at least right on one count, it really is all about time.

The Catholic Christian notion of receiving time as a gift from God is one of the many things which make us counter-cultural. In fact, the number of things which make us counter-cultural is increasing as the West abandons its foundations in Christendom and embraces a secularist delusion.

Our actually choosing to live the Christian year, in a compelling way, can become a profoundly important form of missionary activity in an age which has become deluded by the barrenness of secularism.

A robust, evangelically alive and symbolically rich practice of living liturgically can invite our neighbors to examine our lives and be drawn to the One who is its source - Jesus Christ, the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End - as the emptiness of a life without God fails to fulfill the longing in their own hearts.

In a particular way, Catholic Christians are invited to mark time by the great events of the Christian faith in a Liturgical calendar. However, like so much that is contained within the treasury of the Catholic Church; the practice must be understood in order to be fully received as a gift and actually begin inform the pattern of daily lives.

First, we must jump into the treasure chest, find the jewels and put them on! Otherwise, these practices can become meaningless and seem to some to be empty show or the vestige of a bygone era.

They are neither! They proclaim the very meaning of life. Jesus Christ is King and we are the seeds of His Kingdom scattered in the garden of a world which is waiting to be born anew.


