the stillborn child

All the humans we know – men, women and children – are known by us because they were born and they exist or existed in the world. There are also those whose little lives are generally not celebrated and remain unknown to us because they died before they were born. This sudden revelation to the mother and to the father that their child whose development they had been following through the natural changes in mom's body, sometimes the movement of the baby and the detected heartbeat and images of ultrasound, means the life of the baby is no more.

Though I remember it as part of our family story, I don't remember the event at all when my mother lost her sixth child. And how could I remember it for it was 1962 and I was barely four years old. My mother had carried the baby for 9 months and was in the hospital to deliver this, her sixth child, a boy, who would later be named Michael. I recall my mother saying that while she was tired and groggy at delivery, there was only silence in the room when Dr. Jaciw, our long-time family physician, delivered the newborn. And amid that absence of a baby's cry she heard Dr. Jaciw say, *"I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son* +, and of the Holy Spirit."

No baby was taken home, though my father and mother had our little brother buried in St. John the Evangelist Catholic cemetery in Whitby. My mother was unable to attend the simple service held for her baby but my grandmother went to the morning burial and since she had not seen the child asked if she could. The funeral director opened the little white casket and my grandmother and my father beheld the sight of this perfect little baby boy with milky white skin and fair hair, lying as if sleeping in his little white bed as the sun he had never seen shone on his little cherub face.



When my father died last year on July 8 he was buried in the same cemetery as little Michael, just feet from the spot where Michael's grave had been marked with a simple groundlevel stone marker bearing

the inscription 'Infant Forget'. Before he died my father had designed to have Michael's tiny grave and the earth from it transferred to my mother's grave when her time comes to leave this world, and his simple marker will be buried therein. There are so many well-known and well-worn epitaphs on headstones the world over but I created the one which appears on my parent's and little brother's headstone that would sum up their lives, both lengthy and so short lived. It reads:

TOGETHER IN LIFE WITH GOD TOGETHER WITH GOD FOREVER

Statistics Canada shows that nearly 1 out of every 137 live births in Canada is stillborn yet we hardly ever hear of it. Parents and family are filled with grief and mourn the loss of their child. So often at the news of their child's death mothers enter into a state of shock as their bodies work to recover from the pregnancy itself. And very few babies, as a result, are buried or perhaps are even seen by the parents.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

• Parents of a stillborn child should ask about arrangements for the reception of the stillborn's body. If

not, the stillborn child will be disposed of by the hospital. According to the parents' wishes, they need not see the child if they do not wish to. Some parents request that they be brought the child and they and their families are able to spend some brief time with him or her.

- It is good to give the baby a name.
- If the baby is delivered stillborn it need not be baptized.
- Stillborn babies can and should be buried in consecrated ground if possible.
- Catholic cemeteries will provide a burial place for the baby's remains in a special section of the cemetery at no cost to the family.
- Sometimes funeral homes have absorbed the cost of a small casket on behalf of families or the family themselves have provided a small wooden box, often handmade, to hold the tiny infant. Funeral homes can be consulted as to what they are able to offer the family for the burial of their stillborn child.
- Priests, of course and at no cost to the family, are always available to conduct a brief graveside prayer and committal service for the baby or can be called upon to visit at the hospital before or after a stillborn baby has been delivered.

Often when parents are asking about whether their stillborn child should have been baptized or should be baptized they are really asking whether their child will be with God.

All of the sacraments are for the living and their purpose is to connect us to the power of the Risen Christ in our day to day living. Baptism admits us into the community of Christians with the purpose of putting the faith into practice. Just as no priest would think of giving a deceased person Communion nor could the baptism of a stillborn child indicate the start of a lifelong commitment to follow Jesus and live out the Gospel.

In some pastoral situations priests have baptized a stillborn infant if there is any chance that there might be some slight possibility of life, and in that case it would be *conditional baptism*, on the slightest chance that there is still some trickle of life.

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1261) it states:

As regards children who have died without Baptism, the Church can only entrust them to the mercy of God, as she does in her funeral rites for them. Indeed, the great mercy of God who desires that all men should be saved, and Jesus' tenderness toward children caused him to say: "Let the children come to me, do not hinder them", allow us to hope that there is a way of salvation for children who have died without Baptism. All the more urgent is the Church's call not to prevent little children coming to Christ through the gift of holy Baptism."

The Church, through her priests, ministers and faithful, is here to walk with anyone who has lost a child, stillborn or through death at a young age. Though few can know truly what another person is going through in the loss of a stillborn child, grief is best shared with others who can through a listening ear, an offered prayer or a hand held, walk with you in that lonely place of grief. Ultimately, our Saviour Jesus Christ can be trusted in the restoration and the renewal of all things as we hope and live in His bountiful mercy.
