

#### THE PASTOR'S CORNER Peace and Goodness to all!

IN PLACE OF THE ORDINARY PASTOR'S CORNER, I WOULD LIKE TO ADDRESS AN IMPORTANT ISSUE.

In the past several months, I have experienced a shift in the relationships between funeral directors and the Church. This has involved families talking with funeral director companies for such things as pre-arranged funerals, and services to be held at the funeral parlor chapels. It ends with the funeral directors telephoning me after the arrangements are set with the expectation that I will preside over a funeral at the funeral home at a time that I had not known about, and when I had prior commitments. It is also not permitted to celebrate the Mass of Christian Burial in a funeral parlor chapel. This has been quite disturbing because a family funeral is always something for which I attempt to change every scheduled appointment to meet the needs of a family who is dealing with the grief at the death of a loved one. This is not possible when the arrangements are set without my being a part of the discussion.

At times I have met with families in the hospitals and anointed the sick to assure them that we will be happy to do the mass of Christian burial, only to have the funeral home make other arrangements which do not include the Church directly in the funeral arrangements. I do not know what happened in these situations except to realize that if the mass of Christian burial happens at all, it is only after the fact and in a way that is not appropriate. For this reason, I am addressing the issues that are important for you and the parish. It is an important witness to our family members and friends that our faith is central to our lives. The Mass expresses this beautifully. Parishioners with whom we worship weekly or daily usually attend the funerals of parishioners who have died, because we are members of the Body of Christ as a worship community. To be able to celebrate closure and appreciation for our lives in Christ is a gift that the Mass of Christian Burial brings to the whole community as well as our families.

If you wish to have the mass of Christian Burial for yourself or family members, please call me before you call a funeral director, so we can discuss the regular protocols for the Church and the Mass of Christian Burial. This will help you to inform the funeral director of your wishes as the funeral procedures are set in place. Not all funeral directors are familiar with Catholic ritual procedures. It is also important that you talk with your family members about your wishes and that you make them known, perhaps in your will, that you want to have a Mass of Christian Burial celebrated after death. Sometimes our family members or friends are not aware of how important our faith is to us. The Mass of Christian Burial gives an opportunity to celebrate life as it is eternally granted to all who participate in the life of the Eucharist that is the source and summit of our life in the Church.

Many will presume that these wishes will be known by the family or close friends, yet it is my experience that in these times, such is not always the case. The ordinary manner to proceed is that when someone is close to death, the parish is informed so that we can go to administer the sacraments, and we can discuss the arrangements. When someone dies unexpectedly, it is best to call the parish office or myself directly and I will drop everything to attend to your needs.

The funeral arrangements usually entail my going to the funeral parlor for the viewing to say prayers and meet the family to arrange the mass of Christian Burial. The body is then brought to the Church for the Mass, and either brought to the cemetery for burial or brought to the crematorium and the ashes are then buried at a later time. Sometimes the body is cremated after the viewing and then the Mass of Christian Burial is celebrated with the ashes present at a later time, and then the cremains are brought to a cemetery or columbarium. Having the body present is preferable for the symbolic value, but either is acceptable in the Catholic rituals.

What is most important is that the Mass of Christian Burial is celebrated for deceased Catholics to honour the life of faith and the Sacramental Life of all individuals who are incorporated into the Body of Christ through Baptism and the Eucharist. This participation in the life death and Resurrection of Christ is the most important part of our lives as Christians. It is only fitting that this be remembered in the Mass of Christian Burial to celebrate life in Christ for all eternity.

I pray this will help us all to consider these important matters, and let you know that we are here to serve all from birth and baptism through the sacramental life of Eucharist, Confirmation, Marriage, Professed Religious life or Ordination through death in Christ who is the Resurrection and the Life of All.
