Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

#### Reflections on the Gospel: John 20:19-31

Today's Gospel highlights the source of energy for the postresurrection Christian community: the presence of the crucified and risen Christ and His message of peace. There is no disconnect. The crucified Jesus, whom the disciples knew as their master, is the risen Christ. He has triumphed over death, even as the evidence of His wounds remain. Moreover, His ability to be present with them has no barriers: neither locked doors nor debilitating fear. This is cause for great joy, as is demonstrated by the disciples' reaction to His appearance.

The risen Christ's message – "peace to you" – recalls the teaching that Jesus gave to His disciples in His Farewell Discourse (John 14:1 – 31). Jesus told them that He would be leaving soon but that they should not let their hearts (i.e. their inner selves) be troubled, because He would not leave them orphaned. Instead He would ask the Father to send the Holy Spirit as their Paraclete (Greek, *parakletos*, meaning "helper or court-appointed advocate") to be with them. All they needed to do is to obey His commandment and believe in Him. The commandment is to love one another as Jesus has loved them. In John's Gospel, to believe in Jesus is to trust in Him and align oneself with Him and with the Father. The greeting of peace (Greek *elrenerr*, Hebrew *shalom*) is a wish that the disciples experience a sense of security and safety, because of the saving power of God and Jesus Christ, who is God's agent in the world. Those last words of the soon-to-be-crucified Jesus are now realized in the message of the risen Christ to His fearful disciples.

Like other appearance narratives in the Gospels, this story of the appearance if the risen Christ contains a commissioning: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you" (John 20:21). In the ancient world, kings and other powerful figures would send out their representatives to accomplish their work among their subjects. In this capacity the king's representative took on the role of the king and for all intents and purposes became the king in their midst. In the same way, we are called to join in Christ's ministry, a ministry characterized by peace and reconciliation in a hostile and unreceptive world.

As part of the commissioning, we are told that Jesus "breathed on" (Greek *enephysesen*) the disciples. This word appears only once in the

entire New Testament, but it suggests the second creation story, in which God breathes on Adam and gives him a life-giving spirit (Genesis 2:7). It also recalls the vision in which Ezekiel calls the wind to breathe into the dry bones to bring to life those who had once been exiled (Ezekiel 37). #### Divine Mercy Sunday – Celebrating God's Merciful Love

In the Jubilee Year 2000, Pope John Paul II proclaimed that from that year forward the Second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday. This was proclaimed at the Canonization Mass of St. Faustina Kowalska, who worked throughout her life to make all aware of the merciful love of God, St. Faustina (1905-1938) was born and raised in Poland. Following a vocation to religious life, she was accepted by the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. As a member of the Congregation, she worked as a cook, gardener, and porter. In her spiritual life, her contemplation on the Mercy of God led her to develop a childlike trust in God and deep love for her neighbor.



In her years in the convent, St. Faustina heard a call from God to make God's mercy known to the world so that the world may more fully receive God's healing grace. St. Faustina promoted the Chaplet of Divine Mercy which consists of the recitation of prayers to the Eternal Father with the use of the rosary for the sake of Christ's sorrowful passion.

The Chaplet is prayed as follows:

1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross, one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed.

2. On the Our Father beads, recite the following:

"Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world." 3. On the ten Hail Mary beads, say the following:

"For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

4. Repeat step two and three for all five decades.

5. Conclude by reciting three times:

"Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

When celebrating Divine Mercy Sunday, the faithful are called to reflect more personally on the graces won through the life, death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. In this way their hearts may be more fully aware of the mercy of God for them personally and for the sake of the world. (*From loyolapress.com*)


#### St. Martin I (Optional Memorial on April 13)

Elected Pope in 649, Pope Martin I promptly convened a Lateran council to resolve the Monotheite heresy, which asserted that Jesus had only a divine will and no human will, thus undermining the integrity of the human nature Christ assumed for our redemption. In promulgating the orthodox teaching, Martin drew the ire of the Byzantine Emperor Constans II, who arrested and impriseoned the pontiff. For two years, Martin suffered exile, public indignities, and terrible mistreatment, but he held fast to the Lord. From his prison in Naxos, Greece, he wrote, "For forty-seven days, I have not been given water to wash in. I am frozen through and wasting away... But God sees all things and I trust in him." 
