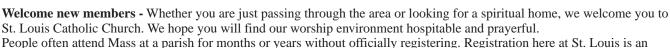

In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year, year 2024 continues as a Year of Prayer. In past bulletins (in 2023) we looked at various prayers based on biblical texts, and (in early months of 2024) at the prayers of the Mass. We may be familiar with May being a month dedicated to Blessed Virgin Mary, June to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and October to the Rosary. But what about the remaining months? Here is a full list of the dedications to help us with our private devotions:

Traditionally each month of the liturgical year is dedicated to some mystery of the faith or special saint, as follows:

January – the Holy Name of Jesus;

February – the Passion of the Lord;

March - St. Joseph:

April – the Resurrection of the Lord;

May – the Blessed Virgin Mary;

June - the Sacred Heart of Jesus;

July - the Precious Blood of Jesus;

August - the Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary;

September – the Holy Cross;

October - the Rosary;

November – the Poor Souls in Purgatory;

December – Advent, or the Coming of Christ.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary - On Nov. 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the 6^{th} century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13^{th} century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names — Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at least the 5^{th} or 6^{th} century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New

Testaments, her assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in His glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with Him body and soul in heaven.


Reflection: In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray her *Magnificat* (Lk 1:46–55) with new meaning. In her glory she proclaims the greatness of the Lord and finds joy in God her Savior. God has done marvels to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply reverenced her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.(*Text:franciscanmedia.org;Image:commons.wikimedia.org/wiki/File: The Assumption of the Virgin MET DT11757.jpg*)

Also in August we celebrate **The Queenship of Mary** (on 22nd) and **Our Lady of Knock** (apparition took place on Aug 21, 1879, but it is observed in Ireland on Aug. 17th)

Pope Pius XII established the feast of the Queenship of Mary in 1954. But the Blessed Virgin Mary's Queenship has roots in Scripture. At the Annunciation, Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. At the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." As in all the mysteries of Mary's life, she is closely associated with Jesus: Her Queenship is a share in Jesus' Kingship. We can also recall that in the Old Testament the mother of the king has great influence in court.

In the 4th century St. Ephrem called Mary "Lady" and "Queen." Later Church fathers and doctors continued to use the title. Hymns of the 11th to 13th centuries address Mary as queen: "Hail, Holy Queen," "Hail, Queen of Heaven," "Queen of Heaven." The Dominican rosary and the Franciscan crown as well as numerous invocations in Mary's litany celebrate her Queenship. The feast is a logical follow-up to the Assumption, and is now celebrated on the octave day of that feast. In his 1954 encyclical *To the Queen of Heaven*, Pius XII points out that Mary deserves the title because she is Mother of God, because she is closely associated as the New Eve with Jesus' redemptive work, because of her preeminent perfection, and because of her intercessory power. Our Lady of Knock - On the evening of 21st of August 1879, a heavenly Apparition occurred at the gable wall of the Parish Church in Knock, Ireland, when Our Lady appeared, in the company of St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist. Unique to the Knock Apparition was the presence of Eucharistic Lamb in front of a Cross, standing upon an altar and surrounded by angels. The Apparition lasted for about two hours and 15 official witnesses gave their testimonies to a Commission of Enquiry. *Our Lady of Knock, pray for us.* (From knockshrine.ie)
