Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

Sacramental Life - St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

In the Book of the Baruch, describing and analyzing the Babylonian exile, the author considers four themes - sin, exile, repentance, and return. Today's reading, coming from the final portion of Baruch's poem of consolation, considers the return from exile.

After having offered a sincere confession of Israel's sin, an interpretation that considers the exile to be a just punishment for that sin, and a reflection upon the mysterious ways of God, the last part of Baruch's poem declares that Israel will return to Jerusalem. He addresses Jerusalem with several directives. She is to "take courage", for God now looks kindly upon her and is putting down her enemy (Babylon). She is to "look towards the east", for her children are returning. Coming to today's passage, we read more of Baruch's exhortations to Jerusalem: "take off the garment of your sorrow and affliction... and put on forever the beauty and glory from God." Jerusalem is to "stand upon the height." All of the glorious things described in this reading - splendour, justice, peace, eternal glory and the safe arrival of Jerusalem's children come from her benevolent God, which is accompanied by "mercy and righteousness." With such a future vision filled with hope, the sins of the past vanish and the trials of the present diminish. (From Workbook for Lectors)



The Advent themes traditionally focus on the virtues and qualities central to the preparation for Christmas. Each year, the Advent themes are always the same: hope, peace, joy, love.

Second Theme: Peace - The Advent theme of peace centers on the tranquility and wholeness that Jesus brings to the world. Celebrated during the second

week of Advent, peace reminds us that Christ's coming is meant to reconcile humanity with God and with one another. In Scripture, peace is more than just the absence of conflict—it's a deep, lasting harmony rooted in God's presence.

What is the importance of peace during Advent?

Isaiah 9:6 foretells Jesus as the "Prince of Peace," whose kingdom will bring justice and peace to all who follow him. This is a common Scripture verse to read during Advent.

As we light the second Advent candle, we reflect on the ways Jesus calls us to be peacemakers in our lives, showing kindness, understanding, and forgiveness to others. Advent peace encourages us to let go of our anxieties, trusting in God's love and guidance. (From ascensionpress.com)

The **Immaculate Conception** is a Catholic dogma that states that Mary, whose conception was brought about the normal way, was conceived without original sin or its stain. That's what "immaculate" means: without stain.

It's important to understand what the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception is and what it is not. Some people mistakenly think that the term refers to Christ's conception in Mary's womb without the intervention of a human father. Others think the Immaculate Conception means Mary was conceived "by the power of the Holy Spirit," in the way Jesus was, but that, too, is incorrect.

The essence of original sin consists in the deprivation of sanctifying grace, and its stain is a corrupt nature. Mary was preserved from these defects by God's grace; from the first instant of her existence she was in the state of sanctifying grace and was free from the corrupt nature original sin brings.

When discussing the Immaculate Conception, an implicit reference may be found in the angel's greeting to Mary. The angel Gabriel said, "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you" (Luke 1:28). The phrase "full of grace" is a translation of the Greek word *kecharitomene*. It therefore expresses a characteristic quality of Mary.

The grace given to Mary is at once permanent and of a unique kind. *Kecharitomene* is a perfect passive participle of *charitoo*, meaning "to fill or endow with grace." Since this term is in the perfect tense, it indicates that Mary was graced in the past but with continuing effects in the present. So, the grace Mary enjoyed was not a result of the angel's visit, but it extended over the whole of her life, from conception onward. She was in a state of sanctifying grace from the first moment of her existence.

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is joyfully celebrated on Dec. 8th each year by the Catholic Church (or moved to Dec. 9th when Dec. 8th is a Sunday). This feast takes place exactly nine months prior to the celebration of her Nativity on Sep. 8th. (*From catholic.com*)

Our Lady of Guadalupe (Dec. 12) - The feast in honour of Our Lady of Guadalupe goes back to the 16th century. Chronicles of that period tell us the story. A poor Indian named Cuauhtlatohuac was baptized and given the name Juan Diego. He was a 57-year-old widower, and lived in a small village near Mexico City. On Saturday morning Dec. 9, 1531, he was on his way to a nearby barrio to attend Mass in honour of Our Lady. Juan was walking by a hill called Tepeyac when he heard beautiful music like the warbling of birds. A radiant cloud appeared, and within it stood an Indian maiden dressed like an Aztec princess. The lady spoke to him in his own language and sent him to the bishop of Mexico, a Franciscan named Juan de Zumarraga. The bishop was to build a chapel in the place where the lady appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan to have the lady give him a sign. About this same time Juan's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Juan to try to avoid the lady. Nevertheless the lady found Juan, assured him that his uncle would recover, and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape or tilma. On Dec. 12, when Juan Diego opened his tilma in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground, and the bishop sank to his knees. On the tilma where the roses had been appeared an image of Mary exactly as she had appeared at the hill of Tepeyac.

<u>Reflection:</u> Mary's appearance to Juan Diego as one of his people is a powerful reminder that Mary—and the God who sent her accept all peoples. In the context of the sometimes rude and cruel treatment of the Indians by the Spaniards, the apparition was a rebuke to the Spaniards and an event of vast significance for the indigenous population. While a number of them had converted before this incident, they now came in droves. According to a contemporary chronicler, nine million Indians became Catholic in a very short time. God's love for and identification with the poor is an age-old truth that stems from the Gospel itself. Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patron Saint of: The Americas & Mexico. Jan. 1 – In 2025 we celebrate the 135th Anniversary of St. Louis Parish.
Fr. Theobald Spetz was placed in charge of the first Waterloo parish (St. Louis) in 1889. The subscription of funds started and in the spring of 1890 the preparation of the ground, formation of the hill and pouring of the foundations took place. The construction was advanced enough for the consecration to take place on the Feast of Epiphany (Jan. 6, 1891) by Bishop Dowling. Year 1890 is accepted as the inaugural year of St. Louis Parish and Feast of the Epiphany as the consecration date.
