**Sunday programs for children -** During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

**Sacramental Life -** St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

Sacrament of Reconciliation - Saturdays 4 - 4:30 p.m., or by appointment.

Marriage - For registered and supporting members, please contact the parish office at least one year in advance of your date.

Anointing and Pastoral Care - Our parish community cares about the sick and elderly and the lonely. Please notify the parish office to arrange for them to receive the Annointing of the Sick, or to have the Holy Communion brought to them.

#### Reflections on the First Reading: Genesis 9:8-15:

What is God's relationship with the world? Is God active in the workings of the universe, or does God maintain complete distance? The Hebrew people crafted a very clear answer. God desires to be in relationship with His people through the establishment of a covenant, a permanent bond calling for mutual fidelity. The most well known of the covenants are those created by God with Abraham (Genensis 17:1-14) and with Moses (Exodus 19-24). Perhaps not so well known is the covenant with Noah, which we encounter in today's reading from Genesis.

The forty days spent by Noah riding the waters of the flood, like the forty days Moses would spend on the mountain with God, represent the time of preparation necessary to receive fully the promise of a new creation. When Noah disembarks and discovers the beauty of the earth and its newly dried land, he erects an altar and makes a sacrifice from every kind of clean animal on the ark (Genesis 8:20). Noah's sacrifice signals his reverence and trust in God, who blesses Noah for all he has done to contribute to the work of salvation.

God establishes a covenant with Noah for all times: "never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood." The sign of God's promise is the rainbow, guaranteeing there will be a definitive end to every storm that threatens the well-being of the world. This primeval story of God's participation in the world suggests that creation constantly receives God's enduring mercy and not His wrath.



On February 22<sup>nd</sup> we celebrate the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter the Apostle. The Lord said to Peter, "You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church" (Matthew 16:18), and "Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16:19). St. Peter's life is so important to the Church that he has more than one feast day during the year. Today's feast is another way the Church celebrates this.

The chair of St. Peter is a symbol of authority, as Jesus refers to this in Matthew 23: 2, when he commands and warns the crowd and his disciples, "The Scribes and Pharisees have taken their seat on the chair of Moses". The "chair" is metaphorically referring to the teaching and judging office that Moses held in the Name of God. The name that Jesus gives to Peter is a second metaphor for an office of teaching and judging, and to drive the point home, Jesus uses a third metaphor by speaking of the "Keys of the kingdom of Heaven" Mathew 16:19. The "power of the keys" is used in many ways; some are specific to the Office of St. Peter - the Papacy, others are shared with those ordained to priestly ministry, - the Sacrament of Confession. During this season of Lent, we pray for these human leaders of the Church chosen by God, so they are faithful ministers of God's grace to us. (From newmanconnection.com)




On this feast 110 candles illuminate the ornate chair by Bernini behind the main altar in St. Peter's Basilica. Bernini's chair contains within it an actual chair that dates at least back to the ninth century.

The chair commemorates Peter's role as teacher, sitting in the office of bishop of Rome, and celebrates the successors of Peter who have held that sacred office. Hence, this feast day is not about an actual chair as much as it celebrates Peter's office of leadership and service in Rome.

Notice how in this baroque masterpiece, there is an alabaster dove window above the chair. This famous window symbolizes the Holy Spirit. Under the dove window, bronze clouds flow toward the chair, supporting it in mid-air. This symbolizes how the office of St. Peter is supported by the Holy Spirit. On the chair itself, Bernini depicts three key scenes from Peter's life: the giving of the keys (symbolizing the authority Christ's gives him to lead the Church), the washing of feet (symbolizing how Peter's office is one of service), and Jesus' instruction to Peter to "Feed my sheep" (pointing to his role as teacher and guide).

Below the chair are large statues of four doctors of the Church. The ones without mitres are from the East: St. Athanasius and St. John Chrysostom. The ones wearing mitres on their heads are from the West: St. Ambrose and St. Augustine. Together they represent four of the greatest theologians in the early Church. Yet, in this depiction they are not the ones holding up the chair. That's what the cloud of the Holy Spirit does. As brilliant as each of these men might have been, they are depicted as pointing in reverence to the Chair of St. Peter.

On this feast day, let's ask St. Peter's intercession for our Holy Father Pope Francis who now sits in the chair-the office-of the bishop of Rome, that he may be blessed in his leadership, service and teaching in the Church. (From edwardsri.com)



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
