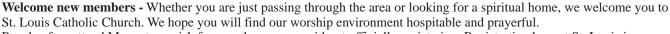

Reflections on the Gospel: Mark 1:14-20:

The opening chapter of Mark's Gospel comprises a wide range of events in the life of Jesus. From the Lord's baptism in the Jordan to His time of fasting and prayer in the wilderness and on to Galilee, where He proclaims the kingdom, calls His first disciples, and heals many who are sick or possessed, it is clear that Mark intends to demonstrate that Jesus is very busy!

But Mark clearly intends something more significant than Jesus having a huge agenda. This opening chapter is structured in such a way as to impress upon hearers that the good news of the kingdom deserves one's immediate attention. In other words, responding to the invitation to "repent, and believe in the good news" is not something that can be put off until tomorrow. While Jesus is silent during His own baptism and says nothing as He is tempted by Satan in the wilderness (in Mark's version), His very first words in Mark's Gospel are: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near." These words deserve our complete attention and a response that is radical and full of faith.

Such is the response of Simon and Andrew, James, and John as they hear the summons: "Come follow me and I will make you fishers of people." Like the fish they hope to catch, these four disciples are lured by Jesus. Their reaction is radical and demonstrates complete faith. Not a question is asked as they leave their nets to follow Him. From the very first chapter of his Gospel, Mark leaves no doubt that following after Jesus and proclaiming the kingdom of God calls for a conversion of heart that begins, not tomorrow, but right now!

The Story of the Conversion of Saint Paul

Saint Paul's entire life can be explained in terms of one experience—his meeting with Jesus on the road to Damascus. In an instant, he saw that all the zeal of his dynamic personality was being wasted, like the strength of a boxer swinging wildly. Perhaps he had never seen Jesus, who was only a few years older. But he had acquired a zealot's hatred of all Jesus stood for, as he began to harass the Church: "...entering house after house and dragging out men and women, he handed them over for imprisonment" (Acts 8:3b). Now he himself was "entered," possessed, all his energy harnessed to one goal—being a slave of Christ in the ministry of reconciliation, an instrument to help others experience the one Saviour.


One sentence determined his theology: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:5b). Jesus was mysteriously identified with people—the loving group of people Saul had been running down like criminals. Jesus, he saw, was the mysterious fulfillment of all he had been blindly pursuing.

From then on, his only work was to "present everyone perfect in Christ. For this I labour and struggle, in accord with the exercise of his power working within me" (Colossians 1:28b-29). "For our gospel did not come to you in word alone, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and [with] much conviction" (1 Thessalonians 1:5a).

Paul's life became a tireless proclaiming and living out of the message of the cross: Christians die baptismally to sin and are buried with Christ; they are dead to all that is sinful and unredeemed in the world. They are made into a new creation, already sharing Christ's victory and someday to rise from the dead like him. Through this risen Christ the Father pours out the Spirit on them, making them completely new.


So Paul's great message to the world was: You are saved entirely by God, not by anything you can do. Saving faith is the gift of total, free, personal and loving commitment to Christ, a commitment that then bears fruit in more "works" than the Law could ever contemplate.

Reflection: Paul is undoubtedly hard to understand. His style often reflects the rabbinical style of argument of his day, and often his thought skips on mountaintops while we plod below. But perhaps our problems are accentuated by the fact that so many beautiful jewels have become part of the everyday coin in our Christian language. (From Franciscanmedia.org)

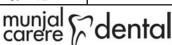
