This account of the Holy Spirit's descent at Pentecost is often heralded for its drama, complete with tongues of fire and the cacophony of diverse languages. While it is dramatic, it is the theological value of the story that deserves our attention. First, the descent of the Holy Spirit occurs during the Jewish festival of *Shavout*. This originally was one of three pilgrimage festivals to Jerusalem; it later came to commemorate the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai. The *Shavout* festival probably had taken on the second meaning by the time of Luke's writing. Therefore, it is likely that the Spirit's descent is intended to enact the giving of the New Law.

The second theological point to consider is the meaning of the tongues of fire. The tongue is a symbol of speech or language. Because the Spirit descends upon each person individually, we are meant to see the validation of a diversity of languages. What takes place at Pentecost is the overturning of the punishment at Babel, where the unity of speech was brought to confusion, causing the people to separate into many tribes. The Spirit unites what has been previously divided.

Finally, this leads to the third theological principle, universalism. From the upper room, where they had preciously huddled in fear, the Holy Spirit moves them to the outside world. They are to reach out to all. Because there were many foreigners gathered in Jerusalem for the celebration of the feast, Luke is demonstrating that the infant Church has the mission to take the Good News beyond the confines of Jerusalem. Mary, Mother of the Church - The theological roots of this title go back to the early Church. The Fathers of the Church, holy and studious bishops of the first centuries, often spoke of Mary as the New Eve. Just as the Woman Eve was "the mother of all the living" (Gen. 3:20), the Woman Mary was mother of all those living in Christ. In Revelation 12:17, St. John says that this Woman's offspring are "those who keep the commandments of God and bear testimony to Jesus." The popularity of the specific expression "Mother of the Church" grew especially in the 20th and 21st centuries. In 2018 Pope Francis added a feast day under this title for the Monday following the Pentecost.

Pope St. John Paul II said: the title "Mother of the Church" ... reflects the deep conviction of the Christian faithful, who see in Mary not only the mother of the person of Christ, but also of the faithful. She, who is recognized as mother of salvation, life and grace, mother of the saved and mother of the living, is rightly proclaimed Mother of the Church.

The memorial of Mary, Mother of the Church, is celebrated the Monday after Pentecost. On Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the birthday of the Church, and on the memorial of Mary, Mother of the Church, Catholics celebrate the fact that Mary, as the mother of Our Lord, is intrinsically linked to the Church as her mother. *(From ewtn.com)*

Images from the Bible adorn the earliest Christian worship spaces. The art allowed them to see what they couldn't read. Sacramental history, salvation history, was portrayed there on the walls even as it was proclaimed from the pulpit.

The ancient Christians knew that it was in the liturgy that we are joined to Christ and His saving mysteries.

It was in the homilies that the Fathers taught the "rule of faith", a brief summary of their beliefs. The rule described how God became man, how Jesus was crucified, rose again, and was glorified, and how all these events were foretold and foreshadowed in the OT.

Prior to baptism, the catechumens were taught the Salvation History. After the baptism, they were taught the doctrine of the mysteries (Mystagogy). The biblical stories, types, and foreshadows that the believer had already learned before baptism now found their completion, in the mystagogical catechesis: the relationship between the Old and the New Testaments and the sacramental rites of the Church, connected through Christ.
