

Reflections on the First Reading: Isaiah 50:5-9

Most of the prophecies in the work known as Second Isaiah (Isaiah 40-55) are oracles of salvation or good news. But, interwoven through these are four poems that trace the life of the "Servant of the Lord," a man who suffered and died to fulfill his divine calling. Some of these poems identify him as Israel, but others as an enigmatic figure who is rejected, killed, and assigned a grave among the wicked (Isaiah 53:8-9). In today's reading, which is part of the third poem, the servant insists that his teachings come from the Lord; "the Lord has opened my ear." Though his call places him in danger he is not "rebellious" and does not "turn backward."

What gives the servant the courage to fulfill his mission no matter what the personal cost, to "set [his] face like flint"? He is convinced that the Lord God is with him, "helping" (Hebrew 'āzar') him. Āzar almost always denotes divine assistance, help that no human could imagine, much less provide. For the Servant, his experience that God is helping him to persevere, moment by moment, is more desirable than the transient peace and security that would be his if he abandoned his call.

The Servant wants his persecutors and contemporaries to know that he does not see himself as disgraced and shamed. He is not a "help-less" victim. He "gives" his back to those who beat it, his cheeks to those who pluck his beard, his face to their punches and spit. The servant lays down his own life, blindly trusting that the Lord is using his suffering and death to accomplish a divine purpose. For this he was born.

The feast of the **Exaltation of the Holy Cross** celebrates two historical
events: the discovery of the True Cross by
Saint Helena, the mother of the Emperor
Constantine, in 320 under the temple of
Venus in Jerusalem, and the dedication in
335 of the basilica and shrine built on
Calvary by Constantine, which marked the
site of the Crucifixion.

The basilica, named the Martyrium, and the shrine, named the Calvarium, were

destroyed by the Persians in 614. The Church of the Holy Sepulcher which now stands on the site was built by the crusaders in 1149.

However the feast, more than anything else, is a celebration and commemoration of God's greatest work: His Salvific Death on the Cross and His Resurrection, through which death was defeated and the doors to Heaven opened.

The entrance antiphon for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is: "We should glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for He is our salvation, our life and our resurrection: through Him we are saved and made free." (*From Catholicnewsagency.com*)



The title, **Our Lady of Sorrows**, given to our Blessed Mother focuses on her intense suffering and grief during the passion and death of our Lord. Traditionally, this suffering was not limited to the passion and death event; rather, it comprised the seven dolors or seven sorrows of Mary, which were foretold by the Priest Simeon who proclaimed to Mary: "This child [Jesus] is destined to be the downfall and the rise of many in Israel, a sign that will be opposed and you yourself shall be pierced with a sword so that the thoughts of many hearts may be laid bare" (Luke 2:34-35). These seven sorrows of our Blessed Mother included the flight of the Holy Family into Egypt; the loss and finding of the child Jesus in the Temple;

Mary's meeting of Jesus on His way to Calvary; Mary's standing at the foot of the cross when our Lord was crucified; her holding of Jesus when He was taken down from the cross; and then our Lord's burial. In all, the prophesy of Simeon that a sword would pierce our Blessed Mother's heart was fulfilled in these events. For this reason, Mary is sometimes depicted with her heart exposed and with seven swords piercing it. More importantly, each new suffering was received with the courage, love, and trust that echoed her fiat: "Let it be done unto me according to Thy word". first uttered at the Annunciation.

St. Bernard (d. 1153) wrote, "Truly, O Blessed Mother, a sword has pierced your heart.... He died in body through a love greater than anyone had known. She died in spirit through a love unlike any other since His" (*De duodecim praerogatativs BVM*).

Focusing on the compassion of our Blessed Mother, our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, reminded the faithful, "Mary Most Holy goes on being the loving consoler of those touched by the many physical and moral sorrows which afflict and torment humanity. She knows our sorrows and our pains, because she too suffered, from Bethlehem to Calvary. 'And thy soul too a sword shall pierce.' Mary is our Spiritual Mother, and the mother always understands her children and consoles them in their troubles. Then, she has that specific mission to love us, received from Jesus on the Cross, to love us only and always, so as to save us! Mary consoles us above all by pointing out the Crucified One and Paradise to us!" (1980).

Therefore, as we honour our Blessed Mother, our Lady of Sorrows, we honour her as the faithful disciple and exemplar of faith.

Let us pray as we do in the opening prayer of the Mass for this feast day: "Father, as your Son was raised on the cross, His Mother Mary stood by Him, sharing His sufferings. May your Church be united with Christ in His suffering and death and so come to share in His rising to new life. Looking to the example of Mary, may we too unite our sufferings to our Lord, facing them with courage, love, and trust." (From catholiceducation.org)


