

Reflection on the First Reading: Isaiah 50:5-9

The Book of Isaiah repeatedly refers to a servant whose identity remains intentionally vague. In four so-called Servant Songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-11, 52:13-53:12), this servant is the primary agent. Today's first reading is part of one of those songs. In it we hear of the close relationship that the Lord forges with the servant. God has opened the servant's ears - a remarkable grace that is to be celebrated! This language of "opening" continues a message from last week's Gospel in which Jesus opened a deaf man's ears to hear by touching them. At the same time, Isaiah advances last week's message. By pointing out the ramifications of having ears opened to God's message and remaining loyal to (or at least not rebelling against) God's message, Isaiah shows that loyalty to God can lead to great suffering. The servant endures beatings, beard-pluckings, and spitting. Yet, through all these indignities the servant endures with God's help. In fact, by remaining loyal to God through suffering, the servant's resolve strengthens. No one can rightly bring a dispute against him, or his case. And he knows it! Fully convinced that God will support him is a case or a trial is brought against him, the servant repeatedly taunts potential contenders, daring them to confront him and his cause. In the servant, then, we see that being loyal to God may mean suffering. At the same time, we also recognize in the servant that suffering-hardened loyalty can beget courage and boldness of the highest order.

The Seven Sorrows of Mary are handed down through Catholic Tradition over more than one thousand years. From the connection of Mary with the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross to the writings of church fathers such as St. Ambrose of Milan, to the Seven

Founders of the Servite Order, and finally the institution of the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows in 1814, devotion to Mary and her sorrows has pervaded the Church since its foundation. Throughout many apparitions, such as the visions to the Servite founders, St. Bridget of Sweden, and at Fatima, Mary has encouraged the faithful to meditate on her seven sorrows and to accompany her in her sufferings; for it is in accompanying her that we also accompany her Son.

While the devotion to the seven sorrows is taken greatly from private revelation, each of the sorrows has its founding in Sacred Scripture. Each can be found and meditated on through the written word of God. And, even though private revelation is not necessary for salvation, the Church has seen fit to institute a feast in remembrance of Mary's sorrows on September 15th. This should be enough for the faithful to see that meditation on Mary's sorrows is recommended by Holy Mother Church, especially during the month of September which is dedicated to them.

As we will see, all of Our Lady's sorrows are intimately tied to her Son. Truly, this is the foundation of Mariology, the glories of Mary are what they are because she is the Mother of God. The seven sorrows of Mary are:

The Prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:34-35)

The Flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-21)

The Loss of Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:41-50)

The Meeting on the Way to the Cross (John 19:17)

The Crucifixion (John 19:18-30)

Jesus is Taken Down from the Cross (John 19:39-40)

Jesus is Laid in the Tomb (John 19:39-42)

Each of these events is a sword that pierced the heart of Mary. Each represents a martyrdom undergone by the Mother of God, as St. Alphonsus Ligouri says, "Mary was the Queen of Martyrs, for her martyrdom was longer and greater than that of all the martyrs." With each martyrdom, she united herself to her beloved Son of whom the Prophet Isaiah speaks: "He was despised and rejected by men; a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not." Isaiah 53:3

Our sorrowful mother was so united to her Son, the Man of Sorrows, that she could not be exempt from His suffering standing beneath his cross. St. Ambrose says it beautifully, "She wanted to die with her Son, so as to rise with Him."

In the 14th century, Our Lady revealed seven promises to St. Bridget of Sweden for the faithful who meditate on her sorrows. She promises: I will grant peace to their families.

They will be enlightened about the divine Mysteries.

I will give them as much as they ask for as long as it does not oppose the adorable will of my Divine Son or the sanctification of their souls.

I will defend them in their spiritual battles with the infernal enemy and I will protect them at every instant of their lives.

I will visibly help them at the moment of their death—they will see the face of their mother.

I have obtained this grace from my Divine Son, that those who propagate this devotion to my tears and dolors will be taken directly from this earthly life to eternal happiness, since all their sins will be forgiven, and my Son will be their eternal consolation and joy.

The beauty in these promises does not need to be explained. The graces attached to this devotion are immense!
