A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR:

his year, as we come to the end of Advent, we might feel that we are being 'shortchanged' in the celebration of this Fourth Sunday of Advent. We basically only have four hours to celebrate this Sunday, then we go right into the Nativity of the Lord.

Even though we only have a few hours to ponder this Sunday, we may come away with a very romantic view of the Annunciation that is based on centuries of art. Perhaps we have seen images of the Annunciation in paintings, in stained glass windows in churches, and maybe even on prayer cards. We envision Mary looking pious and serene toward a warm light of unknown origin, seemingly on the verge of spiritual ecstasy. While we envision this beautiful scene, we tend to forget that the Archangel Gabriel had to tell Mary, "Do not be afraid, Mary."

The great artist Rembrandt pondered the Annunciation and though he never painted the scene, he did make a sketch of his idea for such a painting. In that sketch we see the Archangel Gabriel trying to hold Mary as she falls from a chair. She almost faints after Gabriel's announcement, definitely not a reaction of joy.

Luke begins Gabriel's greeting with the words, "Hail, full of grace. The Lord is with you, you have found favour with God." The word 'Hail' means 'rejoice', but to find 'favour with God' was not always something to rejoice over. Yes, God may have certainly noticed you, but it implied that God had a great task for you, which may have had significant consequences for saying 'yes'.

As we enter our final hours of preparing for Christmas, we should really consider carefully what the announcement of the birth of the Messiah means for us. Does the knowledge of the birth of Jesus Christ make us feel a bit anxious? It should, because His birth ushered in a great change to our world.

This change brought joy, healing, and hope; however, it also brought expectations from God. If we have not pondered these expectations on knowing who Jesus is for us, then we still have prayerful work to do.

Being a Christian brings a huge responsibility. Being a follower of Jesus Christ has tremendous implications for everything we think, say, or do. Mary realized this truth and the Archangel had to tell her not to be afraid.

The one thing that we should not have to do is to worry about how we will succeed in our Christianity. Just like Mary, all we need to say is 'yes'. We are called to do our best and then leave everything else to God.

A child is given to each of us at Christmas. To accept this child in our lives comes with serious responsibilities; however, what we must never do is to worry. God will always be with us, to help us raise this child which we call faith.
