A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR:

his is the last Sunday of the year on which we celebrate an Easter Sunday. The Easter Season officially ends in two weeks with the Solemnities of The Ascension of the Lord and Pentecost Sunday.

On this Sixth Sunday of Easter, we once again have Jesus speaking to His Apostles at the Last Supper. In this passage, Jesus tells the Apostles of the peace He has for them and how His peace is everlasting.

At Mass, Catholics have a rite of peace. After a brief prayer which is said by the priest, either a deacon or the priest himself says, "Let us offer each other the sign of peace." This offer is an acknowledgement of the deep human need for our unity with God and with each other.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal says that in the rite "the Church asks for peace and unity for herself and for the whole human family and the faithful express to one another their ecclesial communion and mutual charity before communicating the Sacrament." For Catholics, the reception of Communion is the ultimate expression of unity in God and with each other.

Today in the Gospel we hear Jesus say "Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives." We need to focus on the last line that Jesus said. The peace which He offers to us is totally different to what the world offers to us. Yes, there are times when people are invited to share the sign of peace at Mass, one's very way of offering it makes it clear that they do not always understand Jesus' gift.

The General Instruction also says, "that each person offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest and in a sober manner." We have all probably seen some people go up and down aisles shaking hands and hugging others. I have seen fellow priests do this as well! We need to remember that Catholics are to say to each other when exchanging the Sign of Peace, "Peace be with you," or "The Peace of the Lord be with you." This peace is not a 'feelgood' peace. It is the offer of the word, "Shalom." This word "Shalom" is a Hebrew word, which often is used as a common greeting such as 'hello' and 'goodbye' but its true meaning is deep and profound. It is the peace of God. This is a gift from God. This is what Jesus gave us when He said, "My peace I give to you." It is not peace, which means the absence of bad things happening to us and all around us. It is the peace that exists within us precisely when bad things are going on. It is the peace that can only exist when we are in union with God.

With the Easter Season soon ending, let us be mindful of the peace which Christ offers to us. It is blessed peace which offers a sign of unity. A union with God and with each other.
