### DARE TO BE BLESSED

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus begins his sermon by telling us to view poverty, hunger, and weeping as blessings, and of richness, fullness, and laughter as reasons for woe. It's an uncomfortable start, especially for a reader living in modern Canada, where most of us enjoy a higher standard of living than nearly anyone who would have been listening to Jesus preach that day.

Many of us are strangers to true hunger, and while few people actually think of themselves as rich, the truth is most of us today have a lot to lose. We focus on maintaining what we have, on staying full, on what makes us laugh. So much of our energy goes into remaining satisfied,

remaining where we are.

But Jesus challenges that satisfaction in today's reading as He exposes the spiritual poverty of accumulation. His words force us to acknowledge the pangs of spiritual starvation that remain even when our bellies are full. And in doing so, Jesus blesses us with the blessing He gave the multitude on the level place.

Like with so many of His teachings, here Jesus sets our understanding and our priorities straight by turning them on their heads. He wants us to grow in faith and spirit and charity, which is so much harder when we feel as though we have further to go down than to go up.

Jesus shows us how much more blessed we are when our energy is focused on doing God's will rather than on accumulating earthly riches. But in our world of plenty, there is still plenty of poverty, hunger, and weeping, and Jesus blesses us with an invitation to become blessings ourselves, by doing something about it.

Taking Jesus up on that offer isn't always easy. It's uncomfortable to lift ourselves out of our comfort and satisfaction to live out teachings that run counter to what power and institutions teach us to value. When we do that in His name, we stand firm and rooted against the flow of a society that so often puts gain above giving, and contempt above compassion.

That's why we need Jesus' last blessing in today's reading most. When we stand up for the hated, the excluded, and the reviled, we also stand with them. When we share in the scorn reserved for those who are immigrants, or experiencing homelessness, or queer, or trans, or people of colour, or disabled, or otherwise marginalized, we're standing with Jesus.
