"For I am convinced that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8.38) This verse, which follows immediately after the passage from today's second reading, hangs framed in my office. It is my ministry mission statement, at the heart of my work and vocation – to proclaim God's boundless love to all people.

It might be hard to believe in this love when we hear the readings this week, which always make me wonder: does God demand the death of the beloved child? For context, Abraham lived in a time where human sacrifice was common. On one level, the first reading teaches us that God does not desire human sacrifice, but faithful trust. As we reflect, we see that Abraham can truly discern this because he is absolutely attuned to God's Word, and so, even with a knife in his hand, he can pause, hear God's call, respond "here I am!" and change course. This reminds us of the need for continual prayer, listening, and discernment in our lives. Another layer is that Abraham has a







great faith in God's prior promise of uncountable descendants. He displays faithful resurrection hope – believing that God could bring life even out of death (Hebrews 11.8-19). Abraham trusts in God's promise, even in the face of obstacles and adversity.

Obstacles and adversity are also what Jesus has been telling his disciples about before the Transfiguration. Repeatedly throughout Mark's Gospel, Jesus predicts that he will suffer and die, and his disciples reject this possibility. We might wonder: did Jesus come into this world only to suffer and die? The Transfiguration invites the disciples (and us) to see Jesus' vocation more fully. Just as at his Baptism, we hear God proclaim Jesus as the Beloved Son. The Transfiguration reminds me of this truth: Jesus does not come to this world simply to die, but to proclaim and embody God's mission of love and mercy. Unfortunately, in our broken world, this wholehearted commitment to God's love all too often leads to suffering and death. Jesus did not enter into the journey seeking death for its own sake, but he was faithful to responding to his identity as the Beloved One, and following the path of love wherever it leads. It is love that calls, and love that sustains the journey.

At our own baptisms, and throughout our lives, God is proclaiming our belovedness to us, and calling us to partner in God's mission of uniting all creation in this love. We too are empowered by the Spirit to proclaim the truth of God's abundant love, and follow where this love leads us with hope and trust. As followers of Christ, we must stand in solidarity with those who suffer, and challenge the forces of this world that alienate, destroy, and dehumanize – even if this means joining Christ in bearing the painful consequences of this mission. With our ancestors in faith, we can trust and live the truth that even in great suffering, there is nothing that can separate us from God's love.

Lent then, is not about suffering for suffering's sake, but about freeing us to receive and give love and fully participate in God's abundant life. One

way to do this is to heed God's voice in the Gospel: "This is my Beloved Son. Listen to him." Spend some time in quiet prayer and friendship with Jesus, perhaps at Tuesday afternoon Adoration. This Lent, may God teach us how loved we are, and how to wholeheartedly follow Jesus' way of love in our context today. May the Spirit empower us all with the grace, faith, and hope we need to be able to bear witness in our world to the promise that nothing can separate us from God's love.
