### **EMBRACING THE CROSS**

During the Horizons of Hope series on palliative care, I reflected on how little our culture is willing to talk about death. We are afraid to acknowledge that death is a natural part of human existence. This can leave us isolated or fearful in the face of our own suffering, or that of our family and friends.

At the same time, we have become desensitized to the violent and horrific deaths experienced daily by children, women, and men around the world and in our city. Violence and systemic oppression have become normal. We change the channel or scroll past it on our newsfeeds –

numb, overwhelmed, and disempowered.

Theologian Dorothee Söelle describes another kind of death, "death by bread alone," where we are so satiated and saturated with material products that we exist in a state of living death, isolated and falsely independent, without purpose. We no longer see anything, or anyone, as gift. This existence – devoid of genuine relationships and filled with anxiety and loneliness – means we are numb to our own death-like living and the violent deaths of others, whom we do not mourn because we do not believe we are connected. I wonder if this is what St. Paul meant when he said that some live as enemies of the Cross, hyper-focused on the material world.

What is the cure for our attitudes towards death? Our readings challenge us to embrace the Cross of Christ. For St. Paul our hope is grounded in the Cross and Resurrection. At the Transfiguration, the voice of God urges the disciples to listen to Jesus, who, immediately before the mountaintop experience and again after, predicts his own suffering and death and tells his friends that the path of discipleship includes the cross.

As we witness through Jesus' incarnation, life, ministry, teaching, and especially through his death and resurrection, God has decisively chosen life over death. God chooses embrace, not exclusion. God chooses the way of humility and interdependence. God chooses to lift up the lowly and the vulnerable. God transforms death into life. God opposes every force which disconnects us from God and one another. Death is not the end of the story for Christians.

Embracing the Cross means we do not need to fear natural death. We no longer need to avoid everything that reminds us of our finitude. We can stop numbing ourselves or turning our back on those who suffer and die. We can actively choose to side with life. We can challenge the systems and structures that bring about unnatural death – like poverty, war, violence, oppression, isolation, and discrimination.

To follow Jesus as a disciple, to listen to him, means to embody his commitment to life and opposition to the forces of death. This Lent, may our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving shake us out of our fear of death, and prepare us to more wholeheartedly embrace the Cross of Christ, in which we find our hope and transformation.


