LOVING IN WIDENING CIRCLES

In the first reading the early Christian community is facing a crisis as it spreads the message of Christ throughout the world: what does it mean to be a follower of Christ? The Christian faith began within the Jewish community. All the early Christians were faithful Jewish people, proclaiming good news to other Jewish people. Yet, as they spread this message beyond their borders, Gentiles too were coming to faith in profound and powerful ways. The question became: did these new followers have to become Jews to follow Jesus? This is the question that brings about the first council of the Church, where, through prayer,

discernment, and discussion, the leaders of the community determine that the Holy Spirit was calling them to expand their imagination about what makes a follower of Jesus. Jewish identity and religious practice were determined to no longer be necessary for relationship with Christ. Our Psalm and Second Reading today resound with the joy of the message of Christ being extended to all nations, without any barriers.

I imagine that it was difficult for these early Christians to leave behind what they had known, to embrace something new – a vision of God's expansive welcome, beyond the familiar ways. There are many moments in the Church where we have been asked, through prayer and discernment, to embrace something new as we encounter new people, experiences, and questions. We are called in every generation to discern how to proclaim the good news in authentic ways. How might the Spirit be calling us today to expand our circle of love and inclusion in the Church, that all may encounter Christ's love?

Participating in the Synod on Synodality renewed my understanding of how to truly listen to the Spirit at work in the Church, speaking throughout our lives. Like at the Council of Jerusalem, the whole Body of Christ was invited into the discernment and encouraged to continue to walk together in the Spirit. I am consoled by Jesus' promise in the Gospel: "the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." Since the very beginning, the Holy Spirit has been guiding the Church through moments of encounter and change, while keeping us rooted in Christ. As we await Pentecost, let us ask for the Spirit to renew us in love of Christ, that we might always know how to extend that love to every person and circumstance we encounter.

SOUND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

Over the course of last week, changes were made to the sound system: New speakers were placed in the chancel around the Altar and underneath the organ loft. Additionally, a new sound amplification system was implemented to take advantage of new digital signals, replacing the radio signal devices used previously.

Over the coming weeks, an additional hearing assistance system will also be set up which brings connectivity to the sound system via Bluetooth through a smartphone app.


