

ST. PETER AND THE PAPACY TODAY

How can today's readings about the Apostle Simon Peter help us to understand the modern papacy?

Throughout the New Testament, the Apostle Simon Peter gets special attention. He is the first to recognize Jesus as the Messiah. In response, Jesus promises him the keys to the Kingdom of Heaven, and that Simon's profession of faith and strong character would be the foundation of Jesus's own Church on earth (giving Simon the nickname "Peter"—meaning "rock"—which seems to have stuck) (Matthew 16:13-20). Peter also recognizes that

Jesus has "the words of eternal life" (John 6:68), and is a witness to the transfiguration of Jesus on Mt. Tabor (Luke 9:28-36). At Pentecost and afterwards, Peter speaks and ministers fearlessly as a witness of the risen Christ, like in today's reading from Acts.

But the New Testament authors don't shy away from telling us about Peter's faults, either. Peter is portrayed as headstrong and a bit, well, dense. Peter tries to dissuade Jesus from undergoing the Messiah's foretold passion, which leads Jesus to call Peter "Satan" (a nickname that didn't stick). Peter also violently defends Jesus with a sword in the Garden of Gethsemane (John 18:10-11), and denies even knowing Jesus three times during the Lord's passion.

In today's reading from the final chapter of the Gospel of John, John paints what I consider to be the ultimate portrait of Peter. Since the Gospel is written after Peter's crucifixion and death in Rome, John can portray Peter knowing the full shape of Peter's earthly life, including his final witness as a Martyr. The result is a portrait of a Judean fisherman—with his human faults and charms—illuminated by the Resurrection and coloured by the powerful witness he would bear until his

death. As the first Bishop of Rome (bishops are the successors of the Apostles), this portrait of Peter is John's depiction of the archetypal and paradigmatic papacy.

Peter follows Jesus's directions, and as a result he and the disciples receive more than they could ever have asked for ("...there were so many fish"), like on the Sea of Galilee earlier in Jesus's ministry (Luke 5:1-11). Peter converses with Jesus honestly and with humility, confirming earnestly three times that he loves Jesus, reversing his three-fold denial during Jesus's passion. As a result of Peter's pledge of love, Peter must be a pastor—a good shepherd—feeding and caring for Jesus' flock ("feed my lambs"). And Peter, the fisherman from the margins of the Roman Empire, must go to the centre of the imperium—to Rome itself—to spread the Gospel. In other words, Peter must be a unifying bridge between the centre and the peripheries.

Through the intercession of St. Peter, let us pray that our next pope will have a deep prayer life, listen closely to Jesus's directions, be close to his sheep, and continue to reach out to the peripheries of the Church and society.


