Preparing for LENT <u>now</u>.

This year has already found us scratching our heads and saying, "Gee, it feels like we've just finished celebrating Christmas and now we're beginning Lent?"

Our surprise over Lent 2016's arrival shouldn't leave us there however, for now is the time to think about what we would like to accomplish spiritually



as we follow Jesus through the desert of forty days.

Jesus, led by the Spirit to meet the spirit (temptation through the Devil) entered into and experienced a real stripping away of the externals so that He would be focused on His own preparation for His public life and eventually His own Passion and Death as our Redeemer. Of course, we're not going to move away for Lent and enter a monastery or convent or go into the woods to live out our Lent, but in a very real sense that is what we need to do in the midst of the Lenten landscape of our lives – to somehow make a change in what we do for this time period so that we are saying to the Lord, "I want to be with you more and draw closer to your love, reconciliation and mercy in this time of Lent." I've always thought that the Lent we enter into will determine the Easter we will celebrate. Lent could come and go without our noticing leaving Easter as a flowerfilled Sunday and not much more.

Why do we celebrate Lent anyway?

Good question. And the answer is found in the first reading of every Ash Wednesday Mass:

"Even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. [Mercy] Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests. the ministers of the Lord, weep. Let them say, 'Spare your people, O Lord!'"

All of these elements are found in our Ash Wednesday and the Sundays of Lent. Our schools call for an assembly of all the children and through the Liturgy of the Word and prayer they distribute the ashes blessed and sent by the parish for the purpose of communal entering into the spirit of Lent itself. The parish celebrates two Masses on Ash Wednesday (noon and 7 pm.) as a gathering of our parishioners and the words of the priest which reflect the call on God to have mercy and spare His people.... from themselves.

Lent is for us. We are the beneficiaries of anything we can offer up, give up, take on or do without. God is God and therefore He doesn't need anything from us, but we need God and out of this truth we seek to draw closer in a variety of ways to Him who, in His goodness, created us and made us for Himself.

Yet there is much more to Lent.

We are all sinners. We admit it every time we gather to celebrate the Mass right from the beginning in the Penitential Rite. But to speak of sin in a general way is to downplay the seriousness of what Lent can help us do for our own good and the good of our immortal souls.

There is a tendency sometimes to look at sin as though the really bad sin is committed by the people who make the news. The adulterers, fornicators, embezzlers, cheats and liars make headline news all the time and if we compare ourselves to them we can be fooled into thinking that we're alright but they are 'real' sinners. No, the difference is: they have been caught. Archbishop Fulton Sheen was once visiting a prison to give a retreat. He began his talk to the inmates by saying, "You may think I am visiting you today as a man with a white hat while you're wearing the black hats because of what you have done that brought you here. Yet in reality, the only difference between you and me is that you got caught, I didn't.

I think that's a good way of looking at sin and to compare ourselves, not to one another when taking a personal moral inventory, but compare ourselves to Christ, our model. There is much sin in all of us in vices and tendencies that can even become the addictions we may struggle with. Taking full advantage of a season of mercy in a time of mercy for the Church can find us realizing, perhaps even for the first time, the real help that the Lord can and desires to give to us.

Since Lent is a Penitential season of the Church there is a great emphasis on returning to the Lord. At the beginning of every Mass, during the Penitential Rite we admit we have sinned "... through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault". Why would we all say we have sinned through our "most grievous fault"? Because sin is hurting someone you love as it hurts the Lord who desires us to live in goodness and freedom. So all our sin, whether our lives be lived out in convents, monasteries or rectories, or in houses, condos, factories or offices — it grieves the Good Lord whom we should love, as we say in the Act of Contrition "above all things".

EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE SHEETS

Perhaps one of the best ways to scan our conscience is to review an Examination of Conscience. (You know, that handout I am now famous for as if I'd invented it and the Ten Commandments.) These will be made available throughout Lent for our parishioners and we will have some available for younger children as well as teenagers and adults. Preparing for and availing ourselves of the mercy, love and forgiveness of Jesus found in the Sacrament of Reconciliation given us by Christ Himself will help us to see clearly our own personal sin with a genuine sense of sorrow for it, name it, confess it and be set free to, with God's real grace and help, begin again on the path of Christ. St. Leo St. Vincent de Paul



Cherub's Cupboard will be here next Sunday February 14.



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
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
