THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

THE SANCTUARY CANDLE



In every church and chapel where the Blessed Sacrament is enshrined in a Tabernacle the world over, a candle burns near it to signify in light the Real Presence of Iesus Christ therein. In many parishes the sanctuary candle's cost is covered by an individual who asks that the candle

burn for Jesus' presence and the intention they bring before Him, for He is the Light of the world and the One who answers all prayer.

When I visited Lourdes many years ago, I was surprised and refreshed to see that the only thing for sale on the grounds of this magnificent and holy shrine dedicated to Our Blessed Mother and her appearing to St. Bernadette in 1858 is the various votive candles that are lit and placed by the faithful for literally a world of intentions. And of all the reasons one could give for why Catholics light candles, the simplest and most profound of them all is found in the sign at the candle stands in Lourdes which states: "This continues my prayer". A candle is not a replacement for prayer but the light of it, flickering, gently moving, is a visible sign that our prayer continues on in the heart of God.

Sometimes, often in more modern churches, you actually have to look around to see where the Tabernacle is located and most often your best indication is in looking for the sanctuary lamp. In our parish, our beautiful and worthy Tabernacle, so generously and anonymously donated to the parish by a donor, is situated prominently and centrally to the sanctuary and the whole church, and is easy to see as is the single candle behind red glass located to the left. Sometimes the glass may be amber but most often it is red, which has always reminded me of the Sacred Heart of Jesus that burns with love for us.

The idea of the Sanctuary Lamp is nothing new or contemporary but in fact, ancient. In Exodus 27:20-21, the Tabernacle of God was to be made of a specific material – bronze, and a candle was to be lit and kept perpetually burning as a sign of God's presence:

"You yourself are to command the Israelites to bring you pure oil of pounded olives ready for the regular mounting of the lamp.

In the Tent of the Presence outside the Veil that hides the Tokens,

Aaron and his sons shall keep the lamp in trim from dusk to dawn before the Lord.

This is a rule binding on their descendents among the Israelites for all time."

After the Reformation with the split of Protestants away from the Roman Catholic Church, so many of those time-honoured and meaningful signs and symbols of sacramental life with Christ were stripped away from Protestant churches, but remained within Catholicism.

Richard White, a historian and graduate from Wycliffe College in Toronto, writes of the stripping away of all things Catholic from the churches and liturgy of the reformers:

"It doesn't do much but flicker and hang there. Sadly, it hasn't always been allowed. We owe a debt of gratitude to a courageous of group of 19th century ritualists who restored the humble sanctuary lamp after an absence of many centuries.

In the years after the Church of England broke with the Church of Rome in the 16th century, our Protestant reformers set out to make worship as un-Catholic as possible both in doctrine and in appearance. Our Protestant forefathers opted for a simpler form of worship.

Under King Edward VI and Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, "altars" were surgically removed and replaced by "communion tables," candles were all but removed, the finery of the priest's vestments was replaced by something plainer, unleavened communion bread was replaced by "real" bread, short sermons replaced by much longer homilies, and the ritual of making the sign of the cross expunged from the service. In the interests of Protestant purity, the sanctuary lamp was joyfully removed. Depending on who was the Archbishop of Canterbury was over the years, worship seldom strayed from the drabness of its Protestant centre.

If you would like to offer an intention through the offering made to the parish of just \$10.00 for the sanctuary candle to burn for 1-week, simply contact the parish office to book this. The intention will be stated at the beginning of the Mass Intentions in our parish bulletin, though this is not a Mass intention and is not announced by the priest at any of the parish Masses.
