"THROUGH MY MOST GRIEVOUS FAULT"

Since the new Roman Missal came out about 5 years ago many of the responses found in the Latin Mass were reinstated. Formerly, before the recent changes we simply said, ".... I have sinned through my own fault". Now we are used to saying when we recite the Confiteor,

"Through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault."

as we correspondingly strike our breast three times as well. I vaguely remember someone who was questioning this restored formula posing the situation of a holy nun living a life of prayer in a cloister having to now say "My most grievous fault", somehow suggesting that the word 'grievous' wouldn't apply to her or to anyone else who is living an exemplary Christian life.

But this could be a dangerous approach to our relationship with God because I think it could lead to a sense that because I am close to the Lord I am free of some of the religious burden of sin. Trust me, I've personally seen this trend in those who, because

they go to church each Sunday can take a Sunday or two off each year when on vacation, which begs the question whether Mass is seen as enjoyment or endurance, feast or fast, response to a great invitation or putting in an hour or less in a church? St. Paul in writing to the Romans: (Romans 3:23) states,

"...all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

Notice that St. Paul doesn't eliminate the righteous person or the one who follows the law of the Lord. Rather, all, everyone without exception falls short because we all sin, for scripture says that even a righteous person sins seven times a day. Only if we have moved toward the loss of a sense of sin can we think we are somehow *good enough* for God.

Again, I think of the powerful and useful image given by Bishop Robert Barron when he speaks about sin. He uses the image of driving in your car away from the sun with a dirty, bug spattered and dirt smeared windshield. As the driver you can easily tell that the windshield needs a clean but you're still able to see through it as you drive and may not treat it as an issue at all. However, if you change your direction and drive toward the sun, the full impact of the dirty windshield on your ability to see becomes evident as you furiously try to use the washers and your wipers to clean the dirt from the windshield so you can safely see the road ahead. You might even stop to clean the window before you proceed down the road.

The same can be said of ourselves. If we journey in life away from God we can think we are doing pretty well. Our moral windshield might not be perfect but we're doing okay. Comparing ourselves to the light around us can lead us to think that we don't need to change anything nor clean our windshield for maximum visibility and sight. We can easily consider the really bad people (the 'sinners') to be those whose names appear in the newspapers and on the news who have committed terrible crimes, and we compare ourselves to them thinking I am not perfect but I'm not as bad as they are. That is, until we bring our lives before the radiant, intense, all-illumining light of Jesus Christ and then all our flaws, sins and silly human thinking come to bear on who and what we really are. St. Peter's recognition of his sin in denying Jesus brought him to cry out to Jesus, "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man." Yet the Lord won't do anything of the kind. Instead he, knowing what we are made of, pursues us, loves us, offers his mercy to those who recognize they have "fallen short of the glory of God".

Holiness means to be set apart from everything else in this world for God. The holy Sister living a life of prayer is still a sinner like every person on the face of the earth, save the Blessed Mother. No saint in the Church's rich history would or could boast that they had no sin, in fact, so often the opposite is true. As their life drew them closer and closer to the heart of Jesus they were more and more aware of their sin, their unworthiness and their greater need for God. All sin grieves the heart of our God.

Is it any wonder we are so confused today about sin? One only has to look at the U.S. Presidential race (to the bottom) over the past few weeks and the mainstream medias' so apparent bias toward support of Hillary Clinton and against Donald Trump. The Second Candidates Debate which took place last week saw both

candidates pointing to what I would call the sins of the other. Hillary called out Trump on the scandal about him which had just broke a few days earlier when a video recording of Donald Trump talking about women was released. Mr. Trump had said crass, derogatory and degrading things about women as he talked with another man. It was shameful, no dispute. Hillary, using her well-rehearsed lines she had developed over the many days of rest she had before the debate obviously thought she would capitalize on the media storm as she sought to expose Donald Trump as being demeaning of women. This from a woman whose own husband, a former president, had a history of not just saying but doing things to women I wouldn't dare print here, all the while Hillary attacked and villainized these women, even threatening them and worse. And the media has largely and so obviously left Bill Clinton's sins and Hillary's own sordid past and horrific political track record untouched while the media feigns shock over what Donald Trump had said eleven years previous with no mention of what Bill Clinton did in action. This of course is the same media which drove the movie Fifty Shades of Gray to be an all-time hit as it depicts degrading things toward women. Where was the outcry toward this movie from the mainstream media? It didn't exist, in fact, they loved it and celebrated it and made it known and popular. Yet Donald Trump says something in a private conversation that is revealed to the world and the media pretends it hasn't heard anything worse, ever. (Can you tell which side I'd be on were I an American?)

My point is, sin is sin. We can't delight in sin but should call it out particularly when it is so public. The debate began with a question from the studio audience which reminded both candidates that "our children are watching". True. Whether sin is committed by the holy man or woman who desires to be a saint or the person who lives devoid of any semblance of a sense of sin. All of us have fallen short of God's glory. He is the One who picks us up, wipes away our sins, makes clean our spiritual windows so that we can see again. He is the One who came to call sinners to himself, a saint being a sinner who falls and, by God's grace, gets back up again.

So, indeed, all of us can rightly and with remorse say, "Through my fault, through my most grievous fault.", for all have sinned.... but we shouldn't be content to leave it that way.

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
