GOING TO THE SOURCE IN CONFUSING TIMES

Whether one considers the times in which we are living as confusing or not, it seems to me, is dependent on how one sees the world and where they get their information in this information overloaded world.

First of all, confusion comes from an inability to understand or make sense of the many things we see, hear and perceive and if left unchecked can lead to a great sense of uncertainty. For example, I would consider our present times to be confusing in that within the world and especially in the Church we are hearing contradictory messages about what are the most important points of focus for our living and what is essential to living out our Catholic lives. For example, many have taken on the issue of climate change as the most important issue of our time and yet it has taken on the passion and the imperative of a religion and in such a short time at that. There are clearly also many opposing voices from other experts and scientists who give clear evidence and proof that we have always experienced climate change and that what we are experiencing now is vastly different depending on whether you are focused on hype or hard data.

This is no different from what we have seen within religions and Christianity itself. The scriptures reveal the truth of God and God's purpose for the human race. We are told that we have a beginning and even an ending in God and we all know, whether we are believers or atheists, that we will all die. Yet, through the ages many Christians have looked around in the cultures in which they were living and from what they saw predicted when it was all going to come to an end, even going so far as to put a date and time on it. Of course, history has proven they were misguided and ultimately wrong and that they had wasted precious time and energy from their lives in upholding their views. In the end, as the 'due dates' of their predictions came and went, they were proven wrong about when the world would end. We had such a case just about seven years ago when a movie, based on a Mayan prophecy, depicted the world ending in 2012. And by the way, we're still here and yet again the predictions and the hype were wrong.

Of course, the real danger isn't in *when*, as some are claiming, that the world is going to end in 12 years from now (or less, depending on when people actually started claiming this) if we don't drastically change our way of living, burning fossil fuels, eliminating plastic straws, etc. The danger is in the distraction of time over purpose. Our purpose is to know Jesus Christ in the here and now and on this very day and not tomorrow. Again, each of us only has one day to live and that is this present day. Any of us, and in fact, all of us could be gone by supper time tonight if the Lord said so.

The 'when' of things can be such a dangerous distraction to what we need to do right now in getting ourselves right with God, living our present moment in His presence and living in right relationship with Him and our neighbour. When I've had occasion to visit a cemetery for a burial or just made a visit to a particular grave, I often look around at the vast number of headstones and grave markers and wonder how many of them were actually ready to go, how many were so suddenly taken from this life and perhaps weren't prepared at all to leave the world they were immersed in. God, of course, is the only one who knows the human heart but it is an important reminder for us to take stock of this present moment and what we should be putting our energies toward.

What is the most important issue for a Catholic? Am I right with God and my neighbour. Our sudden departure from this world at any moment will realize that this is the only thing that matters.

Of course, this isn't to say that taking care of our souls and concern for the souls of others means that we won't have concern for the environment, the future, and the needs of the world around us. It's just that on a scale of priorities the quest for God must be paramount, thus the mission of the Church has been and must continue to be most vital.



The need to return to Jesus, the Source of all truth, knowledge, revelation and peace is what is most needed for our lives. It makes little difference if I believe the world is going to

end in twelve days or twelve years if my life will end in five minutes. Among the many, many issues we face in the world and are being called to side with and fight for, there is none more important than the care of our souls and those of others. Doing this will determine everything else that flows from that perspective and reality and what we will use our energy to accomplish.

In the parable of the Rich Fool, Luke 12:16-21, we hear of a man who is rich with land and barns who desires to pull them all down and build even bigger ones in the futility of thinking that he will then possess economic immortality. He is driven by his future but not his future with God. He is deemed a 'fool' by the very commentary of Jesus, who states: "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" What the rich man considered most important were as dust before the timing and plan of God.

The English clergyman, Thomas Fuller, wrote: "A good archer is not known by his arrows but his aim". The aim of the Christian, first and foremost must be his or her relationship with Christ the King and the desire to know Him, love Him and serve Him as such and from this relationship of love should come the love of others, that they too would know Him. If we aim to please Christ in this present moment we won't become distracted by other 'loves' or desires which won't lead to that end. Jesus might say to us, "Why are you interested in saving the planet but are not interested in the salvation of your souls?" While the two are not mutually exclusive they do not carry the same weight. The realized pursuit to land on the moon and perhaps live there is not more important than the pursuit of living on the earth in the here and now. While our times are indeed confusing with many voices, opinions and demands being offered, none is more important than the care of souls. In this there should be no confusion. (Fr. Charles)
