
PARISH REGISTRATION:

LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY PASTORAL VISITATION

If you or someone in your family is in the Oshawa, Whitby or Port Perry Hospitals and would like to have a priest (for serious reasons) visit the person who is sick for Anointing of the Sick, Last Rites, Confession or Communion, please note that there is a full-time Catholic Priest assigned to these three hospitals at various times of the week. Simply ask hospital staff to inquire as to whether *Father Pius Alejo* is present in the hospital (or when he will be). If Father Pius Alejo is not available and there is an emergency requiring a Catholic priest, please call St. Leo the Great Parish at 905-655-3286 and when prompted, press "8" and leave your message. Fr. Charles will receive your message (if he is available) and return your call. If there is no emergency but you would like to speak to Fr. Charles, please call the parish office and leave a message with the parish secretary at 905-655-3286 x 101.

A CRUCIFIX FOR OUR CHURCH



As a Catholic I have been raised seeing a crucifix: on the end of a Rosarv. hanging on the walls of our house and in churches the world over. It has been portrayed in the countless stone and canvas depictions of the greatest sculptors and artists on earth and it is central to our Catholic faith and backed by the writings of Saint Paul himself. For many, even sometimes Christians, the image of

Christ on the Cross is a stumbling block or a mere frozen moment from the past when Christ Our Saviour died but then rose again. There are those who would hold that the crucified Christ is a past event only and that the Resurrection itself is the final and lasting word. But St. Paul wrote, after he had returned to Corinth from speaking about the Resurrection in Athens and making only a handful of converts,

> "For I decided to be concerned about nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. (1 Cor. 2:2)

Again and again in the Mass itself we hold up Christ on the Cross as our proclamation until He returns to the earth. We sing it in our Memorial Acclamation:

"We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again."

or

"When we eat this bread, and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, O Lord, until you come again."

We begin and end each Mass with the sign of Jesus' Cross and all who are baptized have first been traced with the Cross on our foreheads and anointed before baptism with the Oil of Catechumens, having traced on our bodies the sign of the Cross. Our sins are forgiven us under the sign of the Cross made by the priest over us for it was on the Cross that our sins are forgiven as well as the sins of all who would come to Christ for that forgiveness He imparts.

Visible in every Catholic church are the 14 Stations of the Cross, but these don't depict a cross moving about on its own toward Calvary but Our Blessed Lord carrying that Cross, the symbol of burden, torture and death. And on that Cross He was nailed and died, uttering as His last words, "It is finished". We might tend to think that the Resurrection is the completion but on the Cross itself Jesus completed His earthly mission because heaven was opened the moment He died. At the moment of His death, not His resurrection, there was a tremendous earth quake, the curtain in the temple which was 60 feet wide and 60 feet high was torn in two – from *top to bottom*! If a man were able to split the curtain in two it would be from bottom to top, but it was torn from the opposite direction to make clear that it was God who did this, exposing the Holy of Holies for the first time.


The people in the temple at the time must have screamed at the sight of seeing this tremendous spectacle wrought by God and beholding the Holy of Holies! The Holy of Holies is now Jesus.

As well, the scriptures say that when Jesus died on the Cross the graves and tombs of many of the Saints were opened and those who rose from them appeared to many people in the City of Jerusalem as a witness that something salvifically earth shattering had just taken place.

The crucifix, far from being a symbol of death only, reminds us who walk the Christian journey of this life that life is not always easy or without its burdens, grief, pain and sorrow. Even to the often asked question of the mysteries of life, "Why?", comes the Crucifix of Our Blessed Lord. When we think that God accepted death on a Cross – the One who would save the world, past, present and future – by this single act of dying on the Cross; the One who "knew no sin" but Who died for sinners, begs us to ask also, "Why did He have to die?

With all of this deep and rich meaning in Christ Crucified, it is fitting that our parish would have a large crucifix – Christ on the Cross, to adorn our high sanctuary wall. The cost of the crucifix has been covered through the beneficence and generosity of a parishioner who wishes to remain anonymous. In time, we will paint the whole high wall of the sanctuary in a colour that is warm and will liven up the gray stone walls. The new spotlights recently erected will cast beautiful life on the corpus, a great symbol for reflection and meditation throughout the liturgical year. The Cardinal himself has given permission to our parish through our committee to erect the Crucifix.

The statue of *The Triumph* we now have, also a Timothy Schmalz creation, will remain with us, being placed in a suitable location. This statue appears to be light from the patina that was put on it after it was made but is actually made of bronze and weighs ³/₄ of a ton. It will be removed soon to make way for the erection of the crucifix called *The Body of Christ*.
